NOTES

Since those attending the Conference are guests of the University, they are entitled to the privileges of the dining room on the second floor of the Statler Club. The Statler is a private club for members and their guests; therefore, it will be necessary for guests to inform the hostess of his or her status. Your registration badge will be sufficient identification. Groups may reserve tables or the small private rooms, and they are advised to do this as far in advance as possible.

The Rathskeller in the basement is reserved during the luncheon period for members, and since it has limited accommodations, our guests are requested not to use it for lunch. The Ivy Room in Willard Straight Hall will be open for breakfast, luncheon, and dinner throughout the Conference. The Home Economics cafeteria and the Dairy Bar are also available, the latter for breakfast and luncheon only.

Except in cases of real emergencies the programs will not be interrupted to call persons from the room to meet callers or answer the telephone. Those at the registration desk will accept messages to be delivered to the presiding officer, who will read them to the audience during intervals between speakers.

The Flower (Veterinary) Library, located on the second floor near the head of the stairs from the main foyer, will be open during the Conference. Any member who wishes to use the Library is welcome to the privilege and the librarians will be glad to offer their help in finding anything wanted.

NOTES

Commercial exhibits will be found in Rooms C-111 and C-117. Both are in the corridors, close to the main foyer.

There will be a SCAVMA employment booth set up in Room D-117 in the north wing, first floor. At the conclusion of the afternoon program on each day of the conference, there will be an opportunity to interview applicants for the practitioners desirous of hiring a student for summer employment or a June graduate.

A shuttle bus service will be operated throughout the Conference on approximately a 15-minute schedule between the motor entrance (east) of Statler Hall and the Veterinary College.
