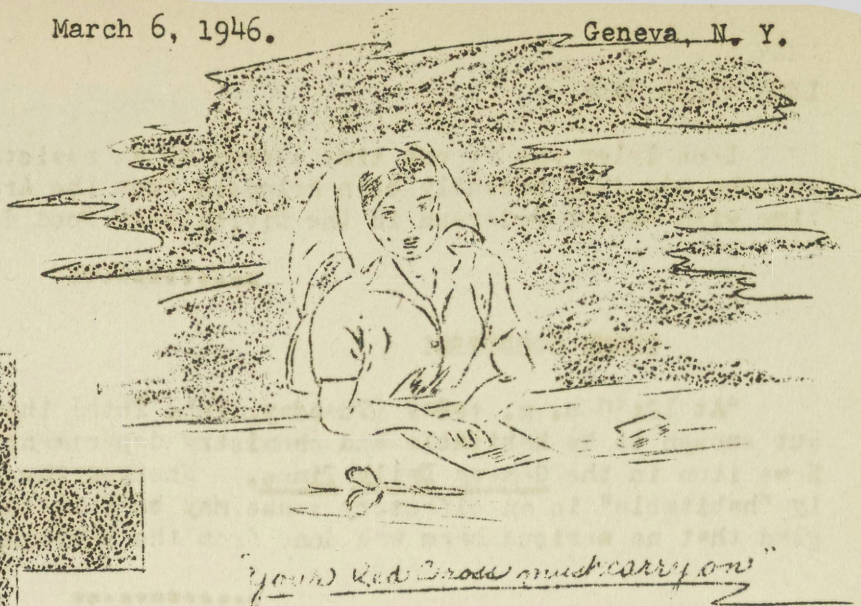
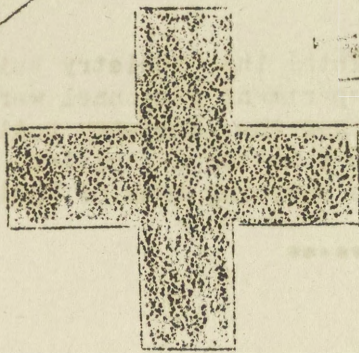


Station News
