A joint dinner meeting will be held at 7 P. M. May 8th in the American Legion Home sponsored by Sigma XI, the University Club, and Cornell University. Dr. John Stanley, Professor and Head of the Department of Zoology at McGill University will speak on the subject " The Theory of Evolution And

Its Influence on Science and Religion".

A renouned authority on pepulation dynamics. Dr. Stanley will present an objective appraisal of the role various theories of evolution have played in shaping modern thought. In his discussion Dr. Stanley will contrast religion of today with that of 500 years ago, presenting the general structure of religion and pointing out where facts of this religious structure present special problems for the intellectual person of today. The speaker will present a brief history and background on theories of evolution and contrast that of Darwin with conttemporary theories. Evolutionary forces currently at work on man and other forms of life will be explered as well as the possibility of deliberate manipulation pf inheritance.

Dr. Stanley was born in London, England, and educated as a zoologist at the University of British Columbia and the University of Minnesota. He was professor of Biology at Queens University, Canada, from 1937-41 and served with the Royal Canadian Air Force from 1941-46. He was appointed professor of Zoology at McGill University in 1946 and Chairman of the Department one year later.
