## VOCATIONAL CONFERENCE.

Y.W.C.A.

One of the problems which confronts many University graduates, particularly women, is - "Now what shall I do for a living?" This question is one which should be decided upon in the undergraduate life of the student so that she may be enabled to shape her course logically and practically. Before choosing her life's vocation she should know her opportunities in various fields. The University has come to realize this and has endeavored to find a solution to the problem. \$150 has been given to carry on the work and arrangements have been made for a series of vocational lectures to be given by experts in various fields in which women might be interested. It has been decided to have these lectures this year instead of the Conference because it is expected that this plan will bring a better attendance. It is up to the girls to respond by being present at every lecture. The first of the series, "Opportunities for Women in Physical Education", to be given by Dr. Meylan of Columbia University has been unavoidably postponed. The date on which it will be given will be announced as soon as possible.

When the girls of the University heard that they were to be excluded from the "Billy" Sunday meetings to be held Monday in Bailey Hall, they immediately sent petitions asking for the privilege of hearing him speak. Both Miss Osborn and Mr. Whitenair have been working hard to have this request granted and to this end, Miss Osborn is going to a special conference to-day in Buffalo. Monday at 3 o'clock is the probable time for the meeting at which only women students of the University will be admitted.
