Until the tennis finals are played the Athletic Championship for the year can not be decided. The matches will be played off some time this year.

SPORTS AND PASTIMES.

Rally day was a great success. The interest and enthusiasm shown by the girls who came out and joined in the fun and cheered for their respective classes made the day a fitting close for the athletic season. Those who have worked hard for the standing of their class in athletics are to be congratulated.

The crew races resulted in much jubilation in the Senior class. The first race proved a victory for 1917 over 1918 by 1 second. Time 1.52 - 1.53. In the Freshman-Sophomore race the Freshman came in first by about half a boat length, time 1.56 - 1.59. The senior-Freshman contest gave the Seniors the championship 1917 won with flying colors. Time 1.51 - 1.55. Third place was awarded 1918 when they won over 1919 by 3 sec. Time 1.53 - 1.56.

The Juniors repeated their last year's performance by winning the baseball championship from the Sophomore by a score of 10-8. The Freshmen by 29-12.

RED CROSS.

The last two examinations in first aid will be given this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon at quarter to five in Goldwin Smith 124. The girls have come out splendidly for the examination, although this is a very busy time. But there are still several names on the eligible list which are not recorded on examination papers. If you have done the work this far be sure to finish up and get credit for it. Here is an added inducement offered by the Red Cross.

"If the student desires to continue the study of First Aid following the primary examination, at the end of six months an Advanced Examination may be taken, upon passing which a Red Cross Bronze Medal is awarded, and to this medal may be added bars for subsequent study and examination. Further study is mainly practical and the student should become able to treat any ordinary injury." Next year advanced courses will be given here, and home nursing and dietetics too - enough to prepare girls to be nurse's aids, if they wish. Never mind if you don't care about the medal, you surely care for the training and skill it stands for. All girls eligible for the examination will be welcome on Monday and Tuesday, for your own sake and the sake of Cornell's standing with the American Red Cross.
