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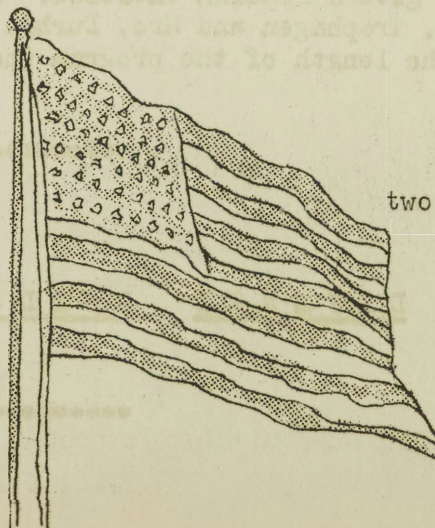

STATE FAIR DATES

Complying with laws which prescribe that the State Fair dates must be announced prior to February 15, Mr. Holton V. Noyes, Commissioner of Agriculture, has set August 30 to September 7 as the dates for the 1942 State Fair. And now Lieutenant Governor Charles Poletti as State Defense Coordinator, assures the State Fair officials that the 102nd annual State Fair will be held on the dates specified and asks that special emphasis be placed on displays "directly related to the war effort". The State Fair was established 102 years ago by the New York State Agricultural Society and moved about from place to place until 1890 when it was permanently located in Syracuse. Last year's Fair drew a record attendance of about 380,000 persons.
