Through the columns of the Bulletin, Miss Gertrude Nye offers a prize of \$5- for an All Cornell Song which can be sung to the music of "Keep The Home Fires Burning". This competition open to all the women, and open for three weeks (until June 12th) will be judged by Professor Sampson, Professor Woodruff and Mr. Boulter, the judges however reserve the right to withhold the award if the poems do not meet the required standard.

There have been a number of songs written by the women, but they have been, it is believed, confined to subjects of interest to the women of the University, to songs of their particular classes, or to songs of Sage or Risley. This is an appeal for a song of such character, quality, of such scope that it will be sung just as enthusiastically by all members of the classes of '36, '37, '38, '39 as by the women of '16, '17, '18, '19.

All verses should be signed with a pseudonym, the writer's real name being placed in a sealed envelope accompanying the manuscript. Verses are to be sent to Box 1, Risley Hall. The music is written by Ivor Novello and the song can be bought at any music shop. There is a copy in the Risley Music Room. In case the music is not easily available, we print one stanza with the refrain as a model for the metre.
