## I. The Mario Einaudi Center for International Studies

This past year saw the Center taking on more administrative functions of the University, without sufficient funding. This is undermining its ability to perform its primary mission of supporting the inter-college academic international studies programs. There has been a continuing effort to enhance opportunities for international study for science and engineering students at Cornell.

## II. Area Studies Programs

### East Asia

During the past year, 57 advanced degrees were awarded, which is a 16% increase over the previous year. Outside support for the program comes from the U.S. Department of Education, The Chiang Ching-Kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange, Henry Luce Foundation, Hong Kong businessman, Mr. L. T. Lam and The Korea Foundation. The program will compete for National Resource Center status in 1993.

### Institute for African Development

### Institute for European Studies

John Weiss has replaced Bill Lesser as the Director of the Program and Co-Director with Valerie Bunce, Director of the Slavic & East European Studies Program, of the Institute of European Studies.

Gail Holst-Warhaft is Acting Associate-Director for 1993-94, while Susan Tarrow is on leave.

### Latin American Studies Program

Lourdes Benerfa has replaced Billie Jean Isbell as Director of the program. A recent review indicates there are 158 academic courses with Latin American content which are attended by over 5,000 Cornell students. Conferences on "The State of Indian America: Prospects for the Future" and "Threats to Democracy in the Andean World" were hosted by the program this year.

### South Asia

During the past year, Ron Herring served as Acting Director for eight months while Dan Gold was in India. The program established the Comell-Nepal Study Program, which provides a study opportunity in that country. The program continues as a U.S. Department of Education Title VI National Resource Center.

### Southeast Asia

This National Resource Center program awarded 17 Ph.D, 14 MA/MS and 15 BA/BS degrees. The program's students are supported by fellowships from the U.S. Government, SSRC, Fulbright, MacArthur and by other international agencies and foreign governments. As of June, 1993, the holdings in the John M. Echols Collection on Southeast Asia have grown to 230,080 books.

#### IV. Development Studies Programs

##### Comparative Economic Development

A special issue of *World Development* (1993) featured a subset of papers presented at the Conference on "State, Market and Civil Organizations: New Practices and Their Implications for Rural Development" sponsored by the program here at Cornell.

##### Cornell Food & Nutrition Policy Program

During the past year, this program moved its offices from Washington, DC to Ithaca and is now located in Savage Hall on the Cornell campus.

##### Cornell International Institute for Food, Agriculture & Development (CHFAD)

During the past year, CEGFAD initiated programs in the Philippines, Honduras and Ghana to complement its programs in Indonesia, the Dominican Republic and Zimbabwe. Cornell has also established a joint MPS degree in Tropical Agriculture with the Panamerican School of Agriculture at El Zamorano in Honduras.

##### Gender and Global Change

This is the follow-up program to the International Development & Women Program described in last year's annual report. Shelley Feldman has replaced Lourdes Benerfa as director.

##### International Agriculture

This program continued its activities in Africa, Latin America, Asia, the Near East and Eastern Europe. It has also been involved in training programs for Rwanda, the World Bank, the Humphrey Fellows and several countries in Eastern Europe.

##### International Nutrition

In the late summer of 1993, Michael Latham will step down as Director of the Program in International Nutrition after 25 years in that position. He will remain as a Professor in the Program and in the Division of Nutritional Sciences. Jean-Pierre Habicht and Jere Haas will take over as co-directors of the program. During the year, the program lost two senior faculty members when Per Pinstrup-Andersen moved to become Director General of IFPRI and Reynaldo Martorell left to become a Professor in the School of Public Health at Emory University in Atlanta. However, David Sahn was appointed Associate Professor and Director of CFNPP and will move from Washington to Ithaca, and David Pelletier has been promoted from Senior Research Associate to Associate Professor. Both are faculty members in the Program in International Nutrition.

### International Studies in Planning

William Goldsmith has replaced Poms Olpadwala as director. The program's major new effort is on urbanization, poverty, and the environment.

### Population & Development Program

Douglas T. Gurak replaced J. May one Stycos as director. The program was successful in obtaining another three-year training grant from the Anna and William Hewlett Foundation, which began in August 1993.

## V. Topical Studies

### Center for International Marketing

Funding for this program was discontinued by the State of New York.

### Comparative Societal Analysis

### Global Transitions

### International Legal Studies

The program received a new grant for an annual Summer Institute in Paris, beginning in July, 1994 in cooperation with the University of Paris I. The Paris Bar has also authorized six \$10,000 scholarships annually for new French lawyers to study in the LL.M. program. The new head of the Law Library has an extensive international background and was educated in Paris.

### International Political Economy

This program organized and sponsored two significant on-campus conferences during the past year. They were: "The Political Economy of the New Europe" (November 1992) and "Food and Agricultural Systems in the World-Economy" (April 1993).

### Peace Studies Program

This year the program has organized conferences on such diverse topics as global environmental change and social justice, the future of the national nuclear laboratories, and women in the military. Lawrence Scheinman, Associate Director of the Program, is on leave, having joined the Clinton administration as Counselor of Nonproliferation in the Department of Energy.

### Social Research for Social Change

The Cornell Participatory Action Research Network was formed in the spring. An electronic conference, seminar series, newsletter, and project oriented work groups now enhance the program's broad coordinative function.

## VI. Educational Programs

### Concentration in International Relations

Sixty-three students successfully completed XR requirements this year and received certificates.

### Cornell Abroad

Enrollment patterns in study abroad programs are changing. During the past year, the number of students going abroad from the College of Arts & Sciences has decreased while there were significant increases in Engineering and Agriculture and Life Sciences students. Minority enrollment included 14% Asian, 3% Black and 4% Hispanic.

### International Students & Scholars

Nearly 300 international undergraduates were admitted in 1993, a record that nearly triples the number admitted in 1985. Major efforts have been undertaken by the program over the past year to improve service to its international clientele.

### Travel Grant Program

Travel Grants awarded in 1993 were similar in amount and distribution to grants awarded in 1992. Because of financial constraints on the Center, the program for 1994 will be cancelled. It is hoped that the program will be able to be revived in 1995.
