EDITORIAL

By tracing the development of industries we can see how the present relationship between capital and labor has arisen.

At first it was so simple that labor and capital were combined in one person, and then as more capital was required partnership arose. With the invention and application of steam, the market enlarged until it became international. Corporations now came with their specialized labor and separated labor and capital still further, hopelessly some thought.

Labor and capital are by nature partners. But if partners they should know each other, rub elbows as it were. Is that possible in the modern industrial world? Yes, because it was tried in the Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. The employees elect representatives to meet the officers of the company and adjust matters together. Both sides have recognized the human element in the other side. Treat the other man as you would have him treat you is the axiom to follow when employing others.
