London, Jan. 30. - The Times today says it is authorized to state that Great Britain for the time being will not arm merchant ships fore and aft as a protection against the German submarines.

New York, Jan. 30. - A big squadron of war vessels formed into a huge net off the American coast today to comb the seas for traces of two German commerce raiders who are supposed to have abandoned the South American field for the more lucrative lanes of the North. In the hunting squadron are said to be the fastest cruisers and destroyers in the British navy.
