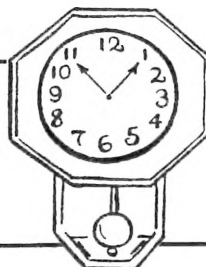

I appreciate the recent offering of a lunch-hour seminar on money management. I was also glad to see the recent survey about interest in street management seminars and workshops, although the topics described are mostly too long to be lunch hour programs. Along those lines, I noticed an article in the March 12 insert of Cornell's *Employment News* that talks about the Cornell Wellness Program. Is there a branch of this program here in Geneva? In particular, the article mentions a workshop now being offered at Cornell campus called "Culinary Hearts Kitchen." It was developed by the American Heart Association to provide information about cooking and shopping for low cholesterol, low salt, and low calorie meals. The course meets over one lunch hour per week for six weeks, and includes slides, tips, handouts, and actual cooking of poultry, breakfast foods, soups, fish, vegetables, and baked goods. Easy preparation of tasty and healthy American, international, and ethnic foods is explained. The cost was only \$5 for non-wellness members and free for wellness members. Several people in my department thought this sounded like a great workshop, and also expressed interest in knowing more about the Cornell Wellness Program. What can you tell us about the Wellness Program? And is there any chance of holding a "Culinary Hearts Kitchen" workshop during lunch hours at the Station - perhaps this summer?
