9. The following letter from Martin J. Insull was presented :

*Mr. D. Livingston Farrand, President,
Cornell University,
Ithaca, New York.*

DEAR SIR : —

In order to provide some aid for students who must work their way through the University, I suggest the following plan for your acceptance :

1. I will pay to the University each year not less than \$500. It is my expectation to continue these payments indefinitely but I reserve the right to discontinue them at my discretion.

2. The payments as made shall be credited to a fund and used for making loans *first*, to deserving students in Sibley College who have

been pursuing their studies there for at least one year and *second*, in the event that the calls for loans in any year do not exhaust the funds available, then to deserving students in other departments of the University, who have attended the University for at least one year.

3. Such loans shall be made on the unsecured promissory note of the student borrowing, be payable three years from the time the maker leaves the University through graduation or otherwise, or at the option of the maker prior thereto, and shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum. Not more than \$100 shall be loaned in any school year to any one student except in the event that the calls for loans in any school year do not exhaust the available funds, in which event not exceeding \$200 may be loaned to any one student. Loans, however, may be made to the same student in each school year provided funds are available, but the total amount of all loans made to any one student shall not exceed \$500.

4. Any fund at any time on hand may and should be invested in certificates of indebtedness or other similar securities of the United States, which can be readily liquidated to provide cash to make loans when called for.

5. For the present, the principal of payments made may be loaned and reloaned, but I reserve the right at any time to direct that thereafter only the income from the fund shall be utilized for the making of such loans and to make such provision for the use and disposition of the fund as I may desire, subject to your approval, and to designate a name by which the fund may be known.

I am enclosing my check to the University for \$500 to cover the first payment of this fund on the assumption that the conditions stated will be acceptable. I will appreciate your advising me that this is so.

11. The gift of Major Louis L. Seaman of \$300 to establish two prizes, one of \$200 and one of \$100 for the two best essays on "The United States Army Ration in Peace and War", the competition to be open to students in all departments of the University, was accepted. These prizes are to be substituted for those awarded to the Military

Department by Major Seaman for the academic year 1924-25, and the President was authorized to acknowledge receipt of same and express to Major Seaman the appreciation of the Trustees.

13. Professor M. A. Lee's leave of absence was extended for the first term of the academic year 1924-25, without salary.

14. The salary of G. C. Williams, Instructor in Civil Engineering, was increased to \$1,800 a year, for a term of two years, effective July 1, 1924.

15. The salary of True McLean, Instructor in Electrical Engineering, was increased to \$1,800 a year, for a term of two years, effective July 1st, 1924.

16. The following changes in salary in the Department of Physics, effective August 1st, 1924, were made:

17. The President reported that the following arrangements had been made relative to Dean Mann's leave of absence to enable him to act as director of the agricultural work being conducted in Europe by the International Education Board:

An administrative committee consisting of Director Betten, Director Thatcher and Professor Ladd, with director Betten as chairman and acting dean had been formed to administer the affairs of the New York State College of Agriculture and its subsidiaries during Dean Mann's leave of absence to begin as of September 1st, 1924; he however to be relieved of active service August 1st, 1924; also that Director Betten's salary had been temporarily increased to \$7,500 a year and that Dr. Thatcher's had been increased to \$7,000 a year, effective September 1st, 1924.

18. The President reported that Mr. Wace was unable to accept the professorship offered him by the University.

19. The request of Rev. Mr. Riegel, District Superintendent in the Methodist Church, for free tuition for the Rev. C. W. Elleson, a Methodist minister who desires to take undergraduate work in the University, was referred to the President with power.

20. The president was authorized to grant free tuition to Ezra Cornell and Elizabeth Cornell, great grandson and great granddaughter of Ezra Cornell, should the same be requested.

21. The President was designated as the official representative of the University to attend the celebration of the Centennial of the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute to be held on October 3rd and 4th.

22. The President was designated as the official representative of the University to attend the inauguration of Dr. R. E. Vinson as President of Western Reserve University at Cleveland on October 9th.

23. An appropriation of \$12,000 or so much thereof as may be needed was made to cover the cost of preparation of preliminary studies for a new gymnasium by Mr. F. L. Ackerman. This sum is to be charged against the architectural cost of the building should the same be constructed and Mr. Ackerman employed.

23. M. G. Northrup at present Instructor in Machine Design was transferred to the Department of Electrical Engineering with corresponding change in title but with no change in salary (\$1,500).

24. An appropriation of \$7,500 or so much thereof as may be needed was made to cover the cost of preparation by Messrs. Yorke & Sawyer of sketches for an addition to the Library and to the Engineering group of buildings.

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

NOVEMBER 1, 1924.

Present—Trustees Van Cleef, Chairman ; Farrand, Cornell, R. B. Williams, J. DuPratt White, Westinghouse, C. E. Treman, Pound, R. H. Treman ; Faculty Representatives Hall and Burr and Comptroller Bostwick.

Regrets were received from Trustee Wilson and his absence excused.

Action was taken as follows :

1. The minutes of the meeting of September 27, 1924, were approved.

2. The minutes of the meeting of the Agricultural College Council held at Geneva, September 26, 1924, were approved as printed and the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

3. The minutes of the meeting of the Veterinary College Council held at Geneva, September 26, 1924, were approved as printed and the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

4. The death of Trustee George A. Blauvelt on October 16, 1924, was reported and on motion a committee was appointed by the Chair to prepare a resolution on his death. Trustees Farrand, J. DuPratt White and C. E. Treman were appointed on this Committee.

5. The death of Professor J. E. Creighton on October 8th, 1924, was reported and the following resolution adopted by the University Faculty on October 15, 1924, was concurred in by the Board of Trustees.

James Edwin Creighton was a member of the teaching staff of Cornell University for thirty-five years and at the time of his death was the senior active member of the University Faculty. During his long career as teacher, writer, and editor he stamped his personality indelibly on all of his work.

As Dean of the Graduate School he was chiefly responsible for the creation and formulation of its standards and procedure ; as Editor

of the Philosophical Review during a period of over thirty years he read, adjudged, and published a large part of the philosophical articles written in America and through this labor he exerted an influence far beyond the country's boundaries; as a teacher he interpreted with unrivaled clarity and expository skill the great systems of speculative thought and created among his students, as few men have done, a body of disciples, many of whom have become writers and teachers, his living epistles; as a member of our faculties and in the general life of the University he was an extraordinarily impressive and influential figure.

Preeminently he was a man of faith. Tenacious of principles, persistent and persuasive in controversy, he was a protagonist in every important issue that concerned the ends and ideals of university education and government. He was a stalwart and outspoken advocate of the professorial point of view, an ardent believer in the efficacy of open discussion, a lover of the fire of intellectual battle, and impatient of easy and unconsidered acquiescence. His was a rugged and virile mind. He had strong convictions and there was a contagion in his earnestness and sincerity. In his death the University is impoverished by the loss of one of its most distinguished scholars.

6. The Comptroller was authorized to pay the salary which would have been due Professor Creighton on October 15th to Mrs. Creighton and also pay to her one-half of his salary for the current year.

7. The President was authorized to request a Carnegie Pension for Mrs. Creighton.

8. The death of Mr. William H. Sage on October 23rd, 1924, was reported and on motion a committee of three was appointed by the Chair to prepare a resolution on his death. Trustees Farrand, Pound and R. H. Treman were appointed on this committee.

9. The application of Professor Samuel Boothroyd for admission to the benefits of the William H. Sage Pension Fund was granted.

10. The application of Professor H. C. Elmer for admission to the benefits of the William H. Sage Pension Fund was granted with the understanding that the payment of the pension should begin at the time of his retirement.

11. The following leaves of absence were granted without salary:

E. L. Post, Instructor in Mathematics, until such time as he reports for duty.

L. S. Hultzen, Assistant in Public Speaking, for the academic year 1924-25.

12. Leave of absence without prejudice to salary was granted to Professor W. F. Willcox to enable him to attend the International Statistical Institute to be held at Rome April 13-18 next.

13. Sabbatic leave of absence was granted to Professor W. C. Ballard for the second term of the current academic year.

Schiff Foundation for Human Civilization heretofore set aside for the purchase of books, the income from which shall be used for the purchase of books in the field for which the fund was given.

Trust fund of \$750,000 for the benefit of the son. Cornell to receive one-twelfth in case the son dies without decedents.

Charles E. Green. Died 1917.

Trust fund sufficient to give an income of \$1,200 a year for the benefit of the widow. After death or remarriage of the widow an income of \$50 a month is to be paid to the daughter until her death or marriage. On the death or marriage of the daughter the principal is to be paid to Cornell University. The income is to be used for the benefit of worthy students who shall desire instruction in mechanical or electrical engineering, agricultural or architectural courses and whose circumstances are such that they require assistance.

Susan Curtis Woodford. Died 1923.

Trust estate of \$140,000. Income to be used for the benefit of her adopted daughter during her lifetime. At her death without issue the total amount is to come to Cornell University.

E. L. Williams. Died 1921.

Trust fund is established from the residue of the estate to pay certain annual bequests. At the death of the beneficiaries the fund comes to Cornell University to be used toward building an administrative building if one has not already been constructed.

Charles J. Miller. Died 1919.

Residue of estate left in trust, the income to be paid to mother and three other beneficiaries. After death of the mother income of one-fourth is to be paid to Cornell University. After the death of the mother and one other beneficiary one-fourth of the fund is to be paid to Cornell University. Residue of the estate amounts to \$26,194.45. As the mother is now dead Cornell should receive the income from one-fourth of this amount.

Alfred B. Jenkins. Died 1917.

Residue of estate to be divided into twelve equal parts of which Cornell University is to receive one part should the daughter die without issue.

Joseph L. Stichter. Died 1914.

A trust fund of about \$40,000 is established from the residue of the estate for the benefit of the mother and two sisters. After their death principal is to be paid to Sibley College to be added to the endowment fund.

Clinton H. Howland. Died 1900.

One-third of the estate, about \$900, is to come to Cornell on the death of the father. To be used for the purchase of books for the circulating library.

Henry D. Winans. Died 1924.

Cornell to receive only in the event of the lapse of any legacy or upon the death of eight of the beneficiaries.

Duane Studley. Died 1921.

Trust fund created for the benefit of the widow and son. Cornell to receive \$4,000 at the time the son reaches majority should his mother have died prior to that time.

Bernice Haviland Guernsey.

Use of estate left to father and husband. On their death one-half of the estate is given to Cornell University to found a scholarship for girls from Warren County, New York. This bequest is secured by insurance policies taken out by the husband which will insure the payment to Cornell University of \$2,303.87.

Gustav Ulbricht. Died 1924.

\$25,000 given to Cornell University for an Agricultural Scholarship.

L. Phillip Wild. Died 1924.

Cornell to receive one-sixth of the residue of the estate. One-half of the amount to be added to the alumni fund of the University and the income of the other half to be used to purchase music for the cadet band. Estate totals about \$16,000.

Charles H. Baker. Died 1924.

\$5,000 given to Cornell University for the College of Civil Engineering.

Mrs. Mary Gertrude Edson Aldrich. Died 1924.

Left \$5,000 to be used for the Medical College, this amount to be used for a portrait of Dr. William Mecklenberg Polk or some other suitable memorial.

24. The purchase of additional land near the south bank of Casadilla Creek was approved as an expenditure not to exceed \$315.

25. Upon the recommendation of the Heckscher Research Council the following grants were made :

Grant No. 88 : \$125 to Dr. C. E. Case, for the purchase of X-Ray films and developer, for the study of the effect of athletic training on the size of the heart, in accordance with the terms of his letter of October 16th, 1924.

26. The President presented a report of the Summer Session of 1924 and this report was referred to a committee consisting of the President, the Chairman of the Committee on General Administration and the Chairman of the Finance Committee with power as to the appropriations to be made for the 1925 Summer Session, and it was voted that hereafter the report of the Summer Session with general recommendations for the next year be referred to the Budget Committee for examination and recommendation before being submitted to the Trustees.

27. The minutes of the Medical College Council meeting of October 17th, 1924, were approved and the recommendations adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

28. The question of remitting the fees of Mr. Schmidt Ernsthausen was referred to the President with power.

29. The question of the transfer of certain property now or formerly owned by the Goldwin-Smith Estate and known as the Beverly Street Mission in Toronto, Canada, was referred to the University Attorney for investigation and recommendation.

30. Chairman White reported the recommendation of the Advisory Board that the employment of Mr. Bryant Fleming be extended to cover a portion of the campus and the question of fixing the amount of compensation to be paid him for his services as Landscape Architect was referred to Trustee White, the President, and the Comptroller with power.

8. That the request of Dr. O. M. Schloss, Professor of Pediatrics, for permission to make certain changes in the 1924-1925 budget for his department, be granted, it being understood the desired changes will not involve any increase in the total amount allowed for the department (Revised budget attached).

9. That the disposition of the gift to the University of \$5,000 from the late Mrs Aldrich, in commemoration of the late William M. Polk, the first Dean of the Medical College in the City of New York to be used for a suitable memorial, be referred to the Dean.

10. The President presented a letter from Mr. Harold Flack, Executive Secretary of the Cornellian Council of Cornell University, addressed to Dean Niles stating that an alumnus in Detroit was interested in establishing a fund for a Research Professorship in the Medical College.

11. The President reported the details of a conference held on the previous day between Messrs. Sheldon and Whitney, representing the

New York Hospital, and Dean Niles and himself, representing the Medical College, on the progress of the plans for the proposed union of the two institutions. It was agreed at that conference that the College and the Hospital should proceed at once to the formation of their requests to the General Education Board along the lines previously agreed upon and approved and the President outlined the proposed form of the College's appeal, which was informally approved.

The President also reported a conference between Dr. J. F. McKernon representing the Post Graduate Medical School and Hospital, and Dean Niles and himself. The purpose of the conference was an inquiry by Dr. McKernon as to whether Cornell University would consider favorably an offer on the part of the Post Graduate School and Hospital to place that institution under the University for purposes of post graduate medical instruction. The subject was discussed by the Council and, while no formal action was taken, the members of the Council expressed interest in the suggestion and general approval of the plan, provided such action would not complicate the existing negotiations with the New York Hospital and provided further that adequate financial support and resources were made available and that the conditions of affiliation or amalgamation should upon analysis prove satisfactory to Cornell University.

Moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned.

3. The minutes of the meetings of the Finance Committee of June 16, July 1, 14, 17, 26, August 1, 5, 8, September 3, 23, 29, October 10, 14, 17, 25, November 3 and 5, 1924, were approved as printed and the action therein contained ratified and confirmed.

4. The minutes of the Agricultural College Council meeting of September 26, 1924, were approved as printed, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

5. The minutes of the Veterinary College Council meeting of September 26, 1924, were approved as printed, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

6. The minutes of the Medical College Council of October 17, 1924, were approved as printed, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

7. The President presented his report for the year ending June 30, 1924.

8. The report of the Comptroller for the year ending June 30, 1924 as printed was received.

9. Trustee Newman was appointed as the trustee member of the Library Council.

10. Trustee William Metcalf, Jr. was duly elected a member of the Buildings and Grounds Committee.

11. Sabbatic leaves of absence were granted to Professors Carl Becker and H. N. Ogden for the first term of the academic year 1925-26.

12. The following appointments of Non-Resident Lecturers in the College of Law for the current academic year were made :

L. Ward Bannister of Denver to be Lecturer on Water Rights and Irrigation at a compensation of \$250.

Thomas Ewing of New York to be Lecturer on Patent Law at a compensation of \$250.

Leonard C. Crouch of Syracuse to be Lecturer on Practice, without compensation.

Frank Irvine of Ithaca, to be Lecturer on Public Service Commission Law and Practice, without compensation.

13. Upon recommendation of the Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, it was

Resolved, That the number of freshman students admitted in any one year to the College of Arts and Sciences be limited to five hundred, it being understood that such limitation shall apply only to candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and that this rule shall not be so administered as to exclude applicants holding State Scholarships who satisfactorily comply with all requirements for admission.

14. The committee appointed to formulate a resolution on the death of Mr. William H. Sage presented the following which was adopted :

The Board of Trustees of Cornell University have learned with profound regret of the death on October 23, 1924, of their former colleague, William Henry Sage, and desire to record in their minutes an expression of deep appreciation of his long and distinguished service as a member of the Board and his many benefactions which have contributed largely to the progress of the University and which will remain a permanent memorial of his generous interests in its welfare.

Mr. Sage became a member of this Board in 1888 and from that time until his retirement in 1904 gave unreservedly of his time, counsel and material aid. He worked closely with his honored father in the latter's farsighted plans for the advancement of the University. He established the Professorial Pension Fund and, with his brother, gave and endowed the University Infirmary. He made generous gifts for the equipment and beautification of Sage Chapel. His interest in the improvement of the campus was constant and his contributions to that end were notable. His name will hold forever an honored place in the history of the University.

15. The committee appointed to formulate a resolution on the death of Senator George Alanson Blauvelt presented the following which was adopted :

The Trustees of Cornell University here express their profound sorrow upon the death of their colleague, George Alanson Blauvelt, and they commemorate upon their records the invaluable labor and wise counsel he gave so gladly to his University, both as alumnus and as trustee. Coming into this Board in his maturity, after years of successful professional experience and varied and useful public service, he contributed the benefits of both to the welfare of his Alma Mater. His modesty, tact, sagacity and energy won the admiration and respect of his associates everywhere. In the relations of the University to the State of New York and, particularly, in the development of the State Colleges of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine, the University found his thorough knowledge of the administration of the State and of the needs of the University a constant source of helpful action. He was an exemplar of devotion to high and generous causes in his service to his community, to the State and especially to this University of which he was ever a loyal and affectionate son.

16. The question of the purchase of additional land near the East Ithaca station, known as the Reidy lot, at an expenditure not to exceed \$1,000 was referred to the Comptroller and the University Attorney with power.

17. The question of the purchase of a lot on Triphammer Road owned by Mr. C. Legters was referred to the Committee on General Administration with power.

18. The question of the purchase or the consent to the assignment of the leases relative to the Keniston, Creighton and McMahon houses was referred to the Committee on General Administration with power.

19. The question of starting construction on a house for the use of the Professor of Astronomy in accordance with plans already drawn was referred to the Committee on General Administration with power.

20. The gift of \$1,000 by Mr. Edgar L. Hamilton for the establishment of a scholarship for the year 1924-25 in the College of Law for special research work in Corporate Suretyship was accepted and the President requested to express to the donor the appreciation of the Board of Trustees.

21. The Comptroller reported the provision in the last will and testament of Charles F. Smith, late of the town of Southold, N. Y., providing as follows :

“ All rest, residue and remainder of my estate and property, real and personal I give, devise and bequeath to my executor and trustee, hereinafter named, in trust, to collect the annual income therefrom, and to pay the net income, to my grandson Eugene G. Smith, during his natural life, in the discretion of my said executor and trustee. After the death of my said grandson, I direct my said executor and

trustee, to pay over all residue of my estate then remaining to the Trustees of Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., on condition that said trustees hold the principal intact in a fund to be known as the "Charles F. Smith Fund" and said trustees to pay the annual income therefrom to some student at Cornell University from the Town of Southold, N. Y., said income to accumulate in case there is no student from Southold Town and to be added to the principal and the total income from said fund to be paid annually to a student from Southold Town when there is one there, or if more than one, to be paid according to the judgment of said Trustees."

22. The gift of \$1,500 by Francis P. Garvan to pay the salary of a research assistant in Chemistry to assist Prof. W. D. Bancroft was accepted and the President requested to express to the donor the appreciation of the Board.

23. Edward P. Phelps was appointed Research Assistant in Chemistry for the academic year 1924-25 at a salary of \$1,500 to be paid by the gift of Mr. Garvan.

24. Leave of absence without prejudice to salary was granted Mr. C. L. Cottrell, Instructor in Physics for the remainder of the current term.

25. L. R. Andrus was appointed Reader in the Department of Romance Languages for the academic year 1924-25, at a salary of \$500.

26. Dr. James H. Breasted, Director of the Oriental Institute at the University of Chicago was appointed Lecturer on the Messenger Foundation on the Evolution of Civilization in the second term of 1924-25 at a compensation of \$3,000.

27. Authority was given the President to extend invitations to Dr. R. A. Milliken of the California Institute of Technology and Sir William Bragg of the Royal Institution of London for 1925-26, and Professor H. J. Grierson of the University of Edinburgh for the year 1926-27, to act as lecturers on the Messenger Foundation on the Evolution of Civilization.

28. The request of Prof. J. H. Tanner of the Department of Mathematics for permission to retire from active service on March 1, 1926, was granted and the President was authorized to apply to the Carnegie Foundation for a pension for Prof. Tanner beginning March 1, 1926.

29. Prof. O. M. Brauner's leave of absence was extended for the second term of the current academic year, without salary.

30. Upon recommendation by the University Faculty the degree of War Alumnus was granted Murray McConnell.

31. Saturday, January 31st, was set as the date for the Winter meeting of the Board of Trustees, this meeting to be held in New York City.

32. Trustee Seaman reported that the Belgian Government had offered to give two Krupp guns of the 15 millimeter type to the University should it see fit to accept the same. COMMITTEE ON GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

DECEMBER 6, 1924

1. The offer of Mr. Nelson Robinson as outlined by the President was approved and referred to the Finance Committee with power.

2. The inquiry by Trustee Teagle relative to the making of a will by a friend of Mr. Teagle providing for the establishment of a professorship in the geology of oil was referred to the President with authority to approve.

3. The following two proposals submitted by the International Education Board were presented :

(1.) The proposal for cooperation by the University of Nanking, Nanking, China, Cornell University, and the International Education Board for the reorganization and conducting of Plant breeding work ; and

(2.) The proposal that the International Education Board furnish the necessary funds for a visit to the United States of Doctor O. H. Larsen of Denmark.

4. The President also presented certain other projects now under discussion with the International Education Board, particularly development in the field of Rural Education under Professor Works and a study by Professor Boyle of trading in futures on the organized produce exchanges of Europe.

These projects were approved and were referred to the President with power to arrange the necessary details. The President was also requested to extend to the International Education Board the appreciation of the Trustees for the offers made.

5. The following letter was presented by the President :

DEAR PRESIDENT FARRAND :

We desire to establish a memorial to our son, Allen Park Toms, who graduated from the College of Engineering in June, 1923, and who was taken from us in an untimely manner May 1st, 1924, while at work.

We have thought that the best form of such a memorial would be financial assistance to worthy students, and after careful consideration and consultation with Dean Kimball and Director Diederichs we feel that we would prefer some arrangement by which some such student could receive assistance without obligating himself to return the funds thus advanced, unless he desires to do so. For this reason we should prefer to call the memorial the *Allen Park Toms Award*, rather than to use the word "loan" in connection therewith. Our general idea for the practical operation of the award would be that this award should be made on the recommendation of the Dean of the College and the Director of the Sibley College of Mechanical Engineering, with the approval of the Faculty of that school.

It is our desire to limit the award to students in the School of Mechanical Engineering since that was the school in which our son was so greatly interested.

We are not financially in a position at this time to offer a permanent endowment as a foundation for this award, but we would like to offer the equivalent income of about five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) this is to say, about two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars annually until such time as we can see our way to offer a permanent endowment, which we expect to do.

If this proposal meets with your approval we shall be glad to proceed along these lines, and to make a definite provision for the award and to assist in formulating regulations for its operation.

Grant No. 91: \$500 to Dr. H. B. Adelman for the investigation of the development of experimentally produced cyclopia, in accordance with the terms of his letter of November 13th, 1924.

Grant No. 92: \$1,500 to Professor J. G. Needham to complete a Distribution and Habitat List of the Insects of New York State, in accordance with the terms of his letter of November 25th, 1924.

Supplement to Grant No. 11: \$700 to Professor A. H. Wright for the study of the life-histories of frogs, in accordance with the terms of his letter of November 25th, 1924.

Supplement to Grant No. 73: \$625 to Professor H. Diederichs to engage an Assistant to work on Martensite, Flame Propagation, and Heat Transfer Problems, in accordance with the terms of his letter of November 29th, 1924.

Grant No. 93: \$1,000 to Professor G. L. Hamilton for the expenses of printing a volume entitled "Studies on the Old French Epic", in accordance with the terms of his letter of December 1st, 1924.

Supplement to Grant No. 67: \$1,500 to Professors Virgil Snyder and F. R. Sharpe to enable them to co-operate with the National Research Council in the preparation of a Report on Rational Transformation, in accordance with the terms of their letter of December 1st, 1924.

The balance of \$140.80 from Grant No. 38 made to Professors Gage and Fish, was returned to the Heckscher Fund.

10. M. D. Leonard was appointed Assistant Professor of Entomology for a term of seven months at a salary of \$1,000, effective December 1st. Professor Leonard's work will be the preparation of a state list of insects and his salary is to be supplemented by the Heckscher Fund grant No. 82.

11. The matter of the purchase of the lot now owned by Mr. Legters on Triphammer Road was referred to the Comptroller with power.

12. The matter of purchasing the houses owned by Professor Keniston, Mrs McMahon and Mrs. Creighton was referred to the Comptroller to investigate and report with his recommendations.

That Chas. D. Bostwick, as Comptroller, be, and he hereby is, authorized to deliver said certificates duly assigned to said Edward W. Sheldon, and to execute on behalf of Cornell University a contract or trust agreement with said Edward W. Sheldon to carry into effect the proposition of Mr. Nelson Robinson together with any other papers or instruments necessary or incident to the comple-

tion of the transaction, and to affix thereto the University's corporate seal.

2. The Comptroller reported upon the Chesapeake & Ohio convertible 5% bonds held by the University and it was voted to hold the bonds for the present.

COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

DECEMBER 27, 1924.

Present :—Trustees J. DuPratt White, Chairman, Farrand, Sackett, Sanderson and Wakeman ; Comptroller Bostwick and Superintendent Curtis.

Regrets were received from Trustees Whitman and Metcalf and their absence excused.

Action was taken as follows :

1. The Chairman reported that he had arranged with the architects of the Willard Straight memorial that the sidewalk in front of the building should be re-laid with flagging as nearly as possible on the old alignment, and that an allowance be obtained from the contractors for the walk and curb which he hoped would be available for future use. On motion, this action was approved.

2. Trustee Sanderson, as the special committee appointed upon the matter, reported a proposition received from the New York State Gas and Electric Corporation for the purchase by them of the surplus power generated at the University plant, and, on motion, it was recommended that the proposition be accepted with the condition that the contract shall provide for termination upon reasonable notice at the option of the University upon reimbursement by it for the connecting line and meter, less salvage, but without interest. It was further recommended that the Comptroller be authorized to execute the contract when same is approved by the University Attorney.

3. *Resolved* That if the University determine to dredge Beebe Lake, it should cooperate with the City of Ithaca and the Park Commission in contracting for the work or in buying a dredge.

4. *Resolved* : That it is the sentiment of this committee that arrangements should be made for the dredging of Beebe Lake and that the cost thereof should be carried as a separate account in conjunction with the sale of electric power, and that the receipts from this power should be used for amortization of the cost.

The question of cooperation with the City was referred to the Comptroller and the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for report and recommendation.

5. Authorization was given the Chairman to appoint a committee to investigate and report on the most feasible way to increase the efficiency of the power plant, this report to take up the question of rebuilding the plant at its present location, building a new plant at another location or installing new machinery in the present plant. Trustees Sanderson, Wakeman and Whitman were appointed on this committee.

6. The submission by the Chairman of the architect's plans for the new Plant Industry building, Library building and the Greenhouses for the State College of Agriculture to the State Art Commission was approved.

7. The location of the new greenhouses on the pasture lot northeast of the present Dairy building was approved,

8. The construction of a supplemental heating plant for the new greenhouses was decided to be unnecessary.

9. The Comptroller was authorized to request Dr. Watson of the University of Illinois to make an investigation and report on the betterment of the acoustical properties of the New York State Drill Hall.

10. The request of Dean Kinball for certain changes in the offices on the second floor of Lincoln Hall at an estimated cost of \$513.00 was approved, this cost to be paid from the special appropriation for improvements and betterments.

11. *Resolved* : That the Superintendent be authorized to build a retaining wall to support the sidewalk along the south side of Fall Creek Drive at a cost not to exceed \$1,200 under plans to be approved by the Architectural Advisory Board.

Trustee Sackett advised the committee that he would be glad to pay the cost of \$1,200. for this retaining wall. A vote of appreciation was given Trustee Sackett for this offer.

12. The request of Prof. Young that tennis courts be constructed to the north of the present Home Economics building was referred to the Architectural Advisory Board for approval, with the understanding that this committee approves the general policy of the construction of small groups of tennis courts at desirable places about the campus.

13. The repair or replacement of the artificial ice machine in Stimson Hall was approved. Trustee Sanderson offered to make an attempt to have a machine furnished free of charge or at least at a considerable reduction.

Management and will bring to this country the results of Denmark's experience, particularly in the field of cooperative marketing.

A cooperative arrangement has been completed whereby certain members of the staff of the Department of Plant Breeding shall spend some time in the University of Nanking, China, for the purpose of initiating there and elsewhere in China, work in plant improvement by modern methods of selection and hybridization.

The General Education Board has undertaken to strengthen the Department of Rural Education by the contribution of \$10,000 a year for a period of five years beginning July 1, 1925. This grant is for the purpose of enabling the Department to undertake training for such positions as state supervisors, county and district superintendencies, and for leadership in departments of rural education in normal schools and in college and university positions.

Adjourned to Saturday, January 31, 1925, at 9:30. President Farrant, Dean Betten and Director Thatcher also present.

12. The question of extending the vacation period of the County Agricultural Agents, Home Demonstration Agents and County Club Agents was laid over for further consideration at the April meeting of the Council, the Acting Dean in the meantime to submit to the members of the Council copies of his proposal together with a brief on the necessity and desirability of this action.

13. Acting Dean Betten presented a plan for the extension of the work of the School of Home Economics for educating adults in the care and training of children which was approved.

In order to carry out this plan a request to the Laura Spellman Memorial for a grant of \$13,000 annually for four years was authorized.

14. Acting Chairman White gave a report on the progress of the present building program.

15. A Committee consisting of the President, Acting Dean Betten and Director Thatcher was appointed to make recommendations to Committee on Administration relative to the necessary adjustments should the College of Home Economics bill be passed by the State Legislature.

16. That the following temporary appointments at the State Agricultural Experiment Station be approved:

Johannes Christensen, to be Assistant in Research (Entomology) beginning November 9, 1924, at \$100 per month, to continue until a permanent appointee is available.

Mrs. Johannes Christensen, Assistant in Research (Botany) beginning October 29, 1924, at \$150 per month, for five months.

19. The Committee on Hygiene and Sanitation consisting of Professors A. T. Kerr, Chairman ; V. A. Moore, C. V. P. Young, H. N. Ogden and D. F. Smiley, presented through the President a code of regulations, which had been examined and approved by the State Department of Health, for the control of communicable diseases in the University. This code was approved and adopted as the sanitary code of the University and authority was given to the committee subject to the approval of the President to print and circulate same and to prepare, print and circulate such synopsis of its provisions as may be desirable and to take the necessary steps to secure conformity to its provisions.

20. The President reported the details of the appointments made with the International Education Board and the General Education Board as outlined in the minutes of the Agricultural College Council meeting of January 30th, 1925.

21. A gift of \$1,000 from Mr. Earl J. Bennett, '01, for the purpose of purchasing any statutes enacted prior to June 1st, 1901, was reported. This gift was accepted and the President requested to express to Mr. Bennett the appreciation of the Trustees therefor.

22. The request of Messrs. Charles H. Blair, Floyd Mundy and A. B. Trowbridge, Jr., that the University consider the possibility of

selling steam from its central heating plant to Psi Upsilon, Sigma Phi and Kappa Alpha Fraternities situated on the campus, was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the University Attorney with power.

23. A report was made of the provision in the will of Charles Sumner Harmon, late of Chicago, Ill., as follows :

After six specific bequests of \$1,000 each are made, the residue of the estate is left in the form of a trust fund to be held by the trustees and the income paid to three groups of beneficiaries until the youngest great grandchild of the deceased shall become twenty-five years of age. Should the income from this trust exceed \$50,000 in any one year, Cornell shall receive \$5,000 or the total amount of the excess over \$50,000 if it does not exceed \$5,000. When the youngest great grandchild becomes twenty-five if the net annual income equals \$25,000, Cornell University is to receive \$25,000 free of restriction. It is estimated that the estate will not exceed \$100,000.

24. The resignation of R. H. Keniston as Dean of the Graduate School effective as of February 4th, 1925, was reported.

25. Upon the recommendation of the President, Rollins A. Emerson was appointed Dean of the Graduate School for a term of three years at a salary of \$1,000 a year, effective at the beginning of the second term of the current academic year.

9. An emergency appropriation of \$60 was made to cover the expense of reading papers during the current term in the elementary courses in Political Science.

10. Upon the recommendation of the faculty of the Graduate School it was

Resolved, that persons having the doctor's degree or of equivalent standing may be admitted to the privileges of the University and exempted from the payment of fees, until further action of the Board.

11. A report was made of the passage of Chapter 43 of the Laws of 1925 creating the New York State College of Home Economics and the President was authorized to make such changes in the organization of the present School of Home Economics and establish such rules and regulations for the administration of the college as he may deem necessary, pending formal action and necessary amendment of statutes by the Board of Trustees.

12. The President reported the receipt of the following resolutions from the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial :

Resolved, that the sum of \$16,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary be, and it hereby is appropriated to Cornell University for the development of instruction and training in child care for the year beginning July 1, 1925, and

Resolved Further, that the sum of \$13,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary be, and it hereby is, appropriated to Cornell University for the same purpose for each of the three years beginning July 1, 1926 and ending June 30, 1929.

As a part of the plan of work for which the above funds were appropriated and with the approval of the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial, it was recommended to the Board that Dr. Nellie Perkins be appointed Professor of Home Economics at a salary of \$7,500 a year, payable from the Laura Spelman Memorial,

the appointment to be effective July 1, 1925, and for four years or such portion thereof as the funds from the Laura Spelman Memorial may be available.

13. The following applications for sabbatic leave were granted :

Professor E. H. Wood of the Department of Mechanics of Engineering for the first term of the academic year 1925-26 and Assistant Professor A. L. Andrews of the Department of German for the second term of the academic year 1925-26.

14. The applications of Professors R. H. Jordan and Paul H. Underwood for admission to the benefits of the William H. Sage Pension Fund were granted.

15. The gift by Mr. Hoyt, United States Hydrographer, of an instrument for gauging the water level in Fall Creek was reported and an appropriation of \$250 or so much thereof as may be needed to cover the cost of the erection of this instrument was made.

16. Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Hygiene and Sanitation it was

Resolved, that beginning with September, 1925, all students matriculating in the University shall present a satisfactory certificate of vaccination; this certificate to be considered satisfactory only if it certifies to a successful vaccination within five years or certifies that at least three unsuccessful attempts have been made within that same period.

17. Upon recommendation of the Committee on Hygiene and Sanitation the following was added to the Sanitary Code of the University:

Every University student affected with anthrax, chicken-pox, Asiatic cholera, diphtheria, amoebic or bacillary dysentery, epidemic lethargica encephalitis, epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis, epidemic influenza, epidemic streptococcus sore throat, German measles, glanders, measles, mumps, paratyphoid fever, plague, acute anterior poliomyelitis, rabies, scarlet fever, small-pox, typhoid fever, typhus fever and whooping-cough shall be removed promptly to the University Infirmary. However, under special conditions the University Health Office may arrange for proper isolation at some other place than the University Infirmary.

18. The Hooker Electro-Chemical Company having passed the dividend payable September 30th, 1924, on its cumulative preferred stock and Mr. Elon H. Hooker having paid to the University the amount off his said dividend by his personal check, it was

Resolved, that the action of the Treasurer of the University in executing an assignment of this dividend to Mr. Hooker and attaching thereto the University's corporate seal be ratified.

19. The supplemental grant of \$1,500 made under Dec. 6th 1924, to Heckscher Grant No. 67 was changed to Grant No. 76, and a balance of \$140.80 stated to have been left in Grant No. 38 was changed to Grant No. 8.

20. A report was made of the receipt from Mr. Martin J. Insull of an additional sum of \$500 to be added to the scholarship fund which Mr. Insull has established.

21. Upon the recommendation of the Heckscher Research Council the following grants were made:

Supplement to Grant No. 6 : \$2,000 to Professor L. M. Dennis for the investigation of the element Germanium and its compounds, in accordance with the terms of his letter of January 26th, 1925.

Supplement to Grant No. 11 : \$1,800 to Professor F. K. Richtmyer for the employment of an Assistant in the investigation in the laws of the absorption of X-rays, in accordance with the terms of his letter of February 23rd, 1925.

Supplement to Grant No. 89 : \$2,000 to Professors L. M. Dennis and W. R. Orndorff for the investigations of the organic compounds of Germanium, in accordance with the terms of the letter of Professor Dennis of January 26th, 1925.

Heckscher Grant No. 100 : \$2,000 to Professor C. S. Northup, \$1,000 to pay the salary of a part time substitute for the year 1925-26, and \$1,000 for clerical and stenographic help and the purchase of supplies, in order that he may be relieved from half of his University work to edit the Modern Language Association's Middle English Dictionary, in accordance with the terms of his letter of February 28th, 1925.

It was voted to reaffirm the action of January 21st, 1925, with regard to a *supplement to Grant No. 10* and to request the Trustees to revise their action of January 31st, 1925, to set the salary of Mr. Caspar V. Shapiro at \$1,100 for the academic year 1925-26, and to make available \$300 for assistance during the summer of 1926.

22. The matter of the retirement of Mr. John A. Linde who has been in the service of the University as a carpenter for twenty years and who is now over seventy-eight years of age was referred to the Comptroller with power.

23. With the understanding that certain colleagues of his department will carry his work without cost to the University, the leave of absence of L. C. Cottrell, Instructor in Physics, was extended for the current term, without prejudice to salary.

24. To carry on the work of Dr. Sutherland Simpson during his illness, the following appointments and changes in salary were approved:

The salary of J. A. Dye, Instructor in Physiology was increased by \$300 for the current term.

C. V. Noback was appointed Assistant in Physiology for the current term at a salary of \$500 for the term.

25 Dr. W. H. York was appointed Assistant Medical Advisor for the last four months of the current academic year with salary at the rate of \$2,500 a year.

26. It was reported that the E. I. duPont deNemours Company had advised that the duPont Fellowship in Chemistry is to be continued for the academic year 1925-26.

27. The President was authorized to continue for 1925-26 the five existing free tuition scholarships to foreign students.

28. \$100 was appropriated to Professor J. T. Parson in appreciation of his services in engrossing for the University.

29. The President reported regarding the George C. Bolt Scholarships as follows ; that under date of September 3, 1923, Mr. George C. Bolt, Jr., had transmitted his check for \$50,000 to establish five scholarship funds of \$10,000 each, to be known as the George C. Bolt Scholarships, the income from such funds to be awarded "to five male students of limited means in the academic department of Cornell University who shall wholly or in part be dependent upon their own efforts for their expenses in going through the University and who in the judgment of the Board of Trustees shall upon the basis of ability, character, personality and scholarship be worthy of financial aid." This gift was accepted by the Board of Trustees but before being put into operation, conferences were held with Mr. Bolt as to possible modifications of his plan. Under date of February 11, 1925, the President wrote to Mr. Bolt suggesting that three of the proposed Bolt Memorial Scholarships be established on the lines originally suggested by Mr. Bolt and proposing that they be awarded to male students in the College of Arts and Sciences in the senior year who might be qualified under the terms of the gift. It was further suggested to the donor that the remaining capital sum of \$20,000. be devoted to the establishment of a fellowship in history, this fellowship to carry a stipend of \$1,000. a year and to be awarded to a graduate student upon recommendation of the Faculty of the Department or Departments of History. In a letter dated February 23, 1925, Mr. Bolt cordially approved this change and the President recommended that the modification be accepted by the Board of Trustees.

Upon motion, the establishment of a fellowship in history under the terms outlined and the establishment of three scholarships as proposed was approved and the President authorized to make the necessary arrangements for their proper administration.

30. The President was authorized to formulate a letter to be presented to parties interested in the welfare of Cornell University, outlining

the financial present needs of the University and tentative plans for a campaign to meet these needs.

31. A report was made of the endowment campaign being started in the city for the collection of funds for the University.

32. A letter from the Merchants Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce was read relative to the merchandise carried by the Cornell Co-operative Society and the purchases being made by the Purchasing Department of the University for individuals, and a committee consisting of the Comptroller and the Chairman of the Committee on General Administration was appointed to confer with the Merchants Bureau.

33. It was reported that the Governor had appointed Mr. George R. VanNamee as a Trustee of the University to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Trustee Blauvelt, and had re-appointed Mr. Horace White as a Trustee to succeed himself.

34. Upon motion Trustee Van Namee was appointed a member to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Trustee Blauvelt of the committee authorized to submit to the Legislature the requests for appropriations.

35. The Committee on Buildings and Grounds through its Chairman presented a report upon the estimates of cost of two units of the proposed apartment houses on Thurston Avenue with a statement of the estimated cost of maintenance and net return to the University on the investment. It appearing from the estimates that while the average return from University investments might be received, that a minimum return of about 3% seemed assured, it was

Resolved, to authorize the construction of the two units on Thurston Avenue at a cost of \$210,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, the details being referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Comptroller with power, and it was

Further Resolved, That Charles D. Bostwick, Comptroller, be, and he is hereby authorized to execute the contract or contracts necessary or incident to the construction of the building and to attach thereto the University's corporate seal.

36. *Resolved*, that the University convey to the City of Ithaca a strip of land off the west side of the Linn Street lot at the entrance to the Cascadilla Gorge now included in the widened street, and that the Comptroller, Charles D. Bostwick, be, and he hereby is, authorized to execute to the City, deed of conveyance of same and to attach thereto the University's corporate seal.

37. Mr. White reported that, acting under authority previously granted, he and the President had conferred with Mr. Bryant Fleming with regard to landscape operations in connection with the Univer-

sity development. An agreement was reached whereby the University will pay Mr. Fleming a retainer of \$2,500 for the year beginning February 1, 1925, such retainer to cover Mr. Fleming's personal service in the study and preparation of certain specified plans and that in addition the University is to be charged the actual cost to which Mr. Fleming may be put in drafting the plans and for other necessary expenditures. It is understood that the University may stop the operation of plans at any stage. It was further understood that should Mr. Fleming be invited to become the landscape adviser to the Architectural Advisory Board or to become a member of that Board or to become the landscape adviser to the University, the same retainer would cover that service and that such arrangement would not interfere with his executive work in the specific plans to which reference was made. Mr. White reported that Mr. Fleming had informally accepted this appointment and that upon recommendation of the Architectural Advisory Board it was proposed to invite Mr. Fleming to become Landscape Adviser to the Architectural Advisory Board and to the University under the terms described above. This action was approved.

38. The matter of building a sidewalk along the Linn Street lot was referred to the Comptroller with power.

39. An appropriation of \$24,000 or so much thereof as may be needed was made to defray the expenses of the Cornellian Council for the remainder of its fiscal year.

MARCH 20, 1925

Present—President Farrand, Dean Niles, Mr. Place, Mr. Ickelheimer, Dr. Conner and Dr. Elser.

Owing to absence from the city, Mr. Westinghouse was unable to be present.

Moved and carried that the following recommendations be made to the Board of Trustees :

1. That \$500 be transferred from the unused salary appropriation of \$3,500 for an Assistant Professor of Pathology to the general expense account of the Department of Hygiene in order to further research work in that department under the direction of Professor Torrey.

2. That \$1,200 be transferred from the balance of \$2,500 remaining to the credit of the Department of Pathology, for payment of salary for an Assistant in Pathology for the period beginning February 1, 1925, and ending June 30, 1925.

3. That Dr. Fenton Taylor, an Instructor in Clinical Surgery, be paid a salary at the rate of \$300 a year to date from December 1, 1924, until June 30, 1925, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Edwin Pyle, December 1, 1924, for whom there was a salary appropriation of \$300 in the Budget for the current year.

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

APRIL 4, 1925

Present—Trustees Van Cleef, Chairman; Farrand, Cornell, R. B. Williams, Westinghouse, C. E. Treman, R. H. Treman; Faculty Representatives Thilly, Burr and Emerson and Comptroller Bostwick.

Regrets were received from Trustees J. DuPratt White, Wilson, Pound and Senior and their absence excused.

Action was taken as follows :

1. The minutes of the Medical College Council meeting of March 20th, 1925, were presented and approved except as to the Medical College budget and Clinic budget and the appropriations and appointments made as recommended.

2. The following resignations effective at the end of the current academic year were reported :

B. C. Holtzclaw, Jr., Assistant Professor of Greek ; P. A. Northrop, Instructor in Physics.

3. Upon recommendation of the Faculty of the Graduate School a temporary Scholarship in Economics for the academic year 1925-26 with a stipend of \$300 was created. \$50 of this is to come from the unexpended funds credited to existing fellowships and the remainder of \$250 is guaranteed by the department from an anonymous source.

4. The President reported that under the authority granted him the fee for the University Summer Session, the Summer Session in Agriculture and the Summer Session in Biology had been fixed at \$50.

5. The date for the Spring meeting of the Board of Trustees was set for April 25th, 1925.

6. Consent was granted for the leasing by the Cornell Cooperative Society of all the ground floor of Barnes Hall from the C. U. C. A., except the lavatory and the passage leading thereto, for a period of five years at an annual rental of \$2,250.

The University is to continue to contribute to the C. U. C. A. the necessary heat for the building as heretofore. Electricity is to be furnished by the University, payment therefor to be made by the Cornell Cooperative Society.

The structural changes suggested by the Cornell Cooperative Society were approved, the details to meet the approval of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

7. The purchase of the lot adjoining the College Crews boathouse on the inlet was approved at an expenditure not to exceed \$1000 to be repaid from funds obtained for the purpose.

8. Upon recommendation of the Heckscher Research Council, the following grant was made :

Grant No. 101. April 1, 1925, to June 30, 1926. \$1,000 or such part thereof as may be required, to Drs. V. A. Moore and C. M. Carpenter for salaries of assistants, traveling expenses, and the purchase and maintenance of experimental animals, for an investigation of undulant fever, in accordance with the terms of the letters of Dr. Moore of March 12 and 18, 1925.

9. The tuition for the course in Institution Management was increased to \$300 per year, this increase to take effect at the beginning of the academic year of 1925-26.

10. The President reported that under the authority given him he had appointed Dr. Cornelius Betten as Acting Dean of the College of Home Economics with authority to make the necessary reorganization in the faculty thereof and this action was approved.

11. Upon recommendation of the President leave of absence was granted to H. Hermansson for the period from July 1, 1925 to July 1, 1926, under the following conditions: this leave of absence to be without salary except for the sum of \$500 which is to be paid Prof. Hermansson for services which he will render the University while on leave, the balance of his salary or so much thereof as may be necessary to be used for the publication of a supplement to the catalog of the Icelandic collection.

12. The application of Prof. F. S. Rogers for admission to the William H. Sage Pension Fund was granted.

13. The following appointments were made for the academic year 1925-26:

Ralph P. Agnew to be Instructor in Mathematics at a salary of \$1,500 for the year, payable from Heckscher Grant No. 76.

Miss Fay Farnum to be part time Instructor in Mathematics at a salary of \$1,000, payable from Heckscher Grant No. 94.

14. A gift of \$2,000 to the Medical College for the establishment of an obstetrical prize was reported from a donor desiring to remain anonymous. This gift was accepted and the President authorized to extend to the donor an expression of appreciation of the Trustees.

15. A report was made of the number of students receiving free tuition and the value of same.

16. The installation of a fifth boiler in the Central Heating Plant was approved at an approximate cost of \$40,000, the cost of this boiler to be added to the cost of the heating plant and amortized in the same manner as the original cost. The installation of this boiler was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power.

16. *It was Resolved*, that the Cornellian Council be allowed to insert a small slip in the ballot envelopes calling the attention of the alumni to a Book of Views of Cornell University published by the Cornellian Council, the form and contents of this slip to be approved by the President.

17. The Comptroller reported the following provisions in the will and codicil thereto of Sylvester Edick of the Town of Newfane, New York:

"Upon the death of my wife, and not before, I give and bequeath unto Cornell University of Ithaca, New York, the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000), as and for a fund to be known as 'The Sylvester Edick Shaw Fund,' to invest and keep the same invested in the same or similar securities in which the funds of said University are or may be usually invested, and to use and apply the income therefrom annually to establish and perpetually continue a scholarship in Sibley College in said University. * * * * *

Said scholarship shall be awarded to the boy who shall be designated by the alumni of Cornell University, residents of said county of Niagara at the time of such award, and in the event such alumni shall fail to make such designation, then to the boy designated by the principal of Lockport High School ; it is also my wish and I hereby direct that preference shall be given to the boy who is most in need of financial assistance and who shall pursue the course of Mechanical or Electrical Engineering in said university ; and it is my further desire and I hereby direct that after an award has been made to some boy that he shall have the benefit of said scholarship for the entire period of his course, provided that his conduct and progress in his work shall meet the approval of those under whom he is pursuing such course and shall indicate that he will complete such course in the time prescribed by the university."

In the event that the conduct and progress of the boy to whom such award is made shall prove unsatisfactory as above expressed, then, in that event, I direct that the award of such scholarship shall be made to some other boy in his place and stead."

18. The Comptroller reported a fire presumably caused by sparks from a locomotive of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company near Varna which destroyed approximately eight acres of ten year old pine trees.

This matter was referred to the University attorney with authority to make such claim against the Lehigh Valley Railroad as he may deem advisable.

6. It was agreed that the Secretary should call a meeting of the Finance Committee to be held immediately after the Full Board meeting on April 25th.

12. The advisability of postponing the application of the increase of tuition to \$300 for the course in Institution Management to the beginning of the academic year 1926-27 was referred to the President with power.

13. *Resolved*, That with the present information available to the Council it is the consensus of the Council that no action should be taken at the present time in furtherance of the building program, except in carrying forward changes preparatory to the erection of the new buildings.

14. That authority be granted the Comptroller to sign and execute the necessary contracts for the construction of the greenhouses for which bids have already been received.

15. That the Agricultural heating plant be remodeled in order that it may be used as a garage.

16. That the new organization of the College of Home Economics abolishing the Department of Housing and dividing the Department of Household and Institution Management into two departments to be known as Household Management and Institution Management, the latter department to be in charge of a committee consisting of Assistant Professor Lois B. Meek and Professor H. B. Meek be approved.

17. That this council favor the establishment of a single council for the administration of the state colleges and experiment stations.

18. The policy to be pursued in regard to vacations and opportunities for professional improvement for extension workers was approved as follows :

The arrangements under which county agricultural agents, home demonstration agents, and county club agents may be granted leave of absence for professional improvement must receive the approval of both the county extension organization concerned and of Cornell University. So far as the jurisdiction of Cornell University extends approval of vacation or leave of absence for professional improvement of county extension workers may be given under the following conditions :

1. These agents may be given one month's vacation with pay in each fiscal year ; this vacation to be exclusive of sick leave.

2. If any agent is interested in going to summer school or engaging in other study for from two to four weeks in addition to vacation and necessary to complete the course of study, this additional leave in exceptional cases may be granted with pay so far as state and federal funds are concerned. It is understood that Smith-Lever funds can be paid for only one month of vacation in one fiscal year. An agent shall have completed a reasonable amount of service before making application for leave and definite arrangements shall be made with local executive committees regarding such matters as length of leave and intention to return to the county for a period of service prior to taking the matter up with Cornell University. Each person planning for such leave shall submit an outline of the proposed study with his application for leave and this shall receive the approval of the Dean of the New York State College of Agriculture and of the Executive Committee of the county organization before it becomes effective.

3. So far as funds are available, temporary agents may be provided by the College to take the place of the agent on leave or on vacation, where such help is needed by the county to carry on the program.

4. Agents taking advantage of the opportunities thus offered must make a report to the local executive committee of the work done during such leave of absence.

VETERINARY COLLEGE COUNCIL

APRIL 24, 1925

Present—Trustees Farrand, Chairman; Wilson, Miller, J. Du Pratt White, Eastman, Pyrke, Pratt, Newman, Dean Moore, Acting Dean Betten; Faculty Representative Fish and Comptroller Bostwick.

Regrets were received from Trustees Van Namee, Horace White, Graves and Tansey and their absence excused.

Action was taken and recommendations made to the Board as follows:

1. A report was made by Dean Moore of the arrangements made through the International Education Board whereby there may be an exchange of Veterinarians between Cornell University and Europe for the purpose of investigation.

2. That a second story be added to the surgical ward in accordance with plans approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the Comptroller was authorized to execute the necessary contracts for such construction.

3. The following promotions were recommended for 1925-26:

Dr. Myron Gustin Fincher from Instructor in Obstetrics and Ambulatory Clinic to Assistant Professor at a salary of \$2,500.

Dr. Hadley C. Stephenson, Instructor in Materia Medica and Small Animal Clinic to Assistant Professor at a salary of \$2,500.

Dr. J. F. Hendrickson from Assistant to Instructor at a salary of \$1,800.

4. The following expenditures from the departments concerned were approved for the continuance of the necessary work during the summer:

\$250 a month for two months to Assistant Professor Asmus in order that the farriery can be kept open during the summer.

\$150 a month each, for two and one-half months to Drs. M. G. Fincher and E. R. Cushing in the Department of Medicine and Ambulatory Clinic.

\$150 a month for two and one-half months to Dr. H. C. Stephenson, Instructor in Small Animal Clinic.

\$125 a month for two months to Dr. M. H. Mabey in the Consulting Clinic.

That the Department of Pathology and Bacteriology be allowed to spend a sum not to exceed \$300 from the income of the department for departmental work during the summer.

That any department may employ such additional assistance during the summer as its work may require and the Dean approves.

That Dr. D. H. Udall be paid the sum of \$500 from the earnings of department for summer work as Superintendent of the Ambulatory Clinic.

5. That the following appropriations be made from the income of the college :

\$250 be paid the Secretary of the Faculty for summer work.

\$200 to be used toward the entertainment of the New York State Veterinary Medical Society, which is to hold its annual meeting at the college June 24-26, 1925.

That a sum not exceeding \$500 be used for the printing and distribution of the Proceedings of the New York Veterinary College Conference.

6. That the Dean be authorized to nominate a representative to attend the meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association in Portland, Oregon, July 24-28, 1925, and that the necessary expenses of this representative be paid from the income of the college.

7. The budget for the year 1925-26 as presented by Dean Moore was approved for recommendation to the Board.

8. A report was made of a gift of \$1,000 by Miss A. B. Jennings, the annual income to be set apart each year to provide a prize in the Department of Medicine in the State Veterinary College, said prize to be known as the "Anne Besse Prize", The granting of the prize or prizes to be made in accordance with conditions to be fixed by the President of the University with the advice of the Dean of the State Veterinary College and the head of the Medical Department of that college.

COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

APRIL 24, 1925.

Present—Trustees J. Du Pratt White, Chairman ; Farrand, Westinghouse, Whitman, Wakeman and Metcalf, Comptroller Bostwick and Superintendent Curtis.

Regrets were received from Trustee Sanderson and his absence excused.

Action was taken and recommendations made to the Board as follows :

1. The approval of the Faculty Apartment House plans by the Architectural Advisory Board was reported.

2. That the University had purchased all of the property east of Wait Avenue and Triphamer road, except three parcels, that these though desirable were not essential to the construction of the group and that negotiations had been begun with a view to securing these when they came in the market.

3. A report was made of the progress of the arrangements for the development of the gorges and the President stated that a committee

of the faculty had been appointed to confer on the development along lines which will not be detrimental to the biological and scientific research for which the gorges are now used.

4. Chairman White reported that an agreement had been reached whereby a perpetual easement was to be given to the University by the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity for the control of the property lying along the south bank of Fall Creek Gorge. This agreement gives to the University the right to develop the property as a park, but prevents the placing of any buildings thereon. It further provides that should the property be offered for sale at any time, or should it at any time be necessary to sell the property, the University may purchase the same for the sum of \$5,000.

5. A general plan for the location of fields for play on the Alumni Fields prepared by Mr. Gavin Hadden was presented and approved; and permission to proceed with the construction of a new running track and other improvements as the money becomes available.

6. It was the sense of the committee that in view of the necessity of building special foundations and the making of special arrangements for the placing of the instruments used, that it would be impracticable and the excessive cost would make it undesirable to place the observatory dome on the new Civil Engineering building.

7. The installation of a fifth boiler in the Central Heating Plant was approved, the installation to be made by the Department of Building and Grounds and it was

Resolved, That a vote of appreciation be given the Babcock and Wilcox Company for their generous gift in connection with the purchase of this boiler.

8. The Buildings and Grounds Department was authorized to proceed with the necessary plans for carrying out such changes as may be necessary for converting the Agricultural Heating Plant into a garage, and if such plans are approved by the State Architect's Office to proceed to make the necessary changes.

9. That if sufficient salvage can be obtained to pay the cost of razing the old University Heating Plant and the chimneys in connection therewith, that they be removed maintaining only such part of the building as may be necessary to house the existing pumps and hot water tanks.

10. That a memorial tablet bearing the inscription approved by this committee at its meeting on June 6, 1924, be placed in the archway at the west end of Boldt Hall.

11. That this committee recommend to the Board that a new laundry, be built at East Ithaca at a cost not to exceed \$45,000. this cost

to be amortized from the income from the laundry, the plans and location of the building to be approved by the Architectural Advisory Board.

12. The report of Prof. F. R. Watson on the correcting of the acoustical properties of the New York State Drill Hall was presented and it was decided that this report together with a report by the Comptroller of his conversation with Prof. Watson be sent to the State Architect for his approval and it was

Resolved, that a vote of appreciation be given to Prof. Watson for his interest and careful study of the problems involved.

13. Trustee Whitman was appointed a committee of one to make an investigation and report on the future water supply of Cornell University.

14. The plans for the second story to be built on the Veterinary Surgical Ward as recommended by the Veterinary College Council were approved and after the approval of the State Art Commission and the Architectural Advisory Board of the University is obtained, the Comptroller is authorized to execute the necessary contracts for the construction of the addition.

15. A report was made of the award of the contracts for the building of the Agricultural Greenhouse Range.

16. The widening of University Avenue at the turn by Morse Hall was approved.

17. The Committee consisting of Trustees Farrand, J. Du Pratt White and Whitman, which was appointed to examine into the improvements requested by the departments in University buildings was continued for that purpose.

1. The minutes of the meeting of the Board of January 31, 1925, were approved as printed.
2. The minutes of the meetings of the Committee on General Administration of March 7, 1925, and April 4, 1925, were approved as printed and the action therein contained ratified and confirmed.
3. The minutes of the meetings of the Finance Committee of January 31, February 7, February 20, March 10, March 19, March 24, and March 28, 1925, were approved as printed and the action therein contained ratified and confirmed.
4. The minutes of the meeting of the Medical College Council of March 20, 1925, were approved as printed, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.
5. The Agricultural College budget for the year 1925-26 as approved and recommended by the Agricultural College Council at its meeting on April 24, 1925, was approved. The promotions in rank recommended by the Council were also approved.
6. The recommendation that the President be given authority to postpone the increase of tuition from \$200 to \$300 a year in the course in Institution Management until the beginning of the academic year 1926-27 should he deem it advisable to do so, was approved.
7. The Comptroller was granted authority to sign and execute the necessary contracts for the construction of the Agricultural Greenhouse Range.
8. The budget of the Veterinary College for the year 1925-26 was approved as recommended by the Veterinary College Council.
9. The construction of a second story to the Veterinary Surgical Ward was approved and the Comptroller authorized to sign and execute the necessary contracts for such construction.
10. The President reported a gift of \$1,000 by Miss A. B. Jennings, the annual income to be set apart each year to provide a prize in the Department of Medicine in the State Veterinary College, said prize to be known as the "Anne Besse Prize". The granting of the prize or prizes is to be made in accordance with conditions to be fixed by the President of the University with the advice of the Dean of the State Veterinary College and the head of the Medical Department of that college.
11. The budget of the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station for the year 1925-26 as recommended by the Agricultural College Council was approved.
12. The installation of new boilers in the heating plant of the Experiment Station at Geneva was approved should the bids for their

installation come within the amount of the appropriation available and the Comptroller was authorized to sign and execute the necessary contracts for their installation.

13. The dismantling of all the old University Heating Plant, except that portion of it necessary to house the steam pumps and hot water boilers as recommended by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, was authorized.

14. The construction of a University laundry at cost not to exceed \$45,000 and in accordance with the recommendations made by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds was authorized.

15. The appointment of Trustee Whitman as a committee of one to investigate the future water supply of the University was approved and an appropriation of \$5,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary was made for the carrying on of this investigation.

16. The report of the Budget Committee was received and considered and the budget for 1925-26 as recommended, with a few minor changes suggested by the President was approved and adopted and appropriations and appointments made as therein recommended.

17. The Medical College Budget and the Medical College Clinic Budget for the year 1925-26 as proposed and recommended by the Medical College Council was approved and appointments and appropriations made as therein recommended.

18. The resignation of Claude S. Thompson, Assistant in Economics, effective March 16th, was reported.

19. Pursuant to the recommendations of the budget as adopted, the following were by ballot duly had appointed to the positions named, the appointments to take effect July 1st, 1925 :

S. H. Slichter to be Professor of Economics at a salary of \$4,500 a year.

D. C. Gillespie to be Professor of Mathematics at a salary of \$4,000 a year.

T. R. Briggs to be Professor of Physical Chemistry at a salary of \$4,000 a year.

Appointment of Jean Wolfender to be Instructor for one year at a salary of \$2,100.

Leave of absence, without salary, for the first term for Instructor D. E. Richmond.

Appointment of Harry I. Lane to be Instructor on part time for one year at a salary of \$1,350.

Instructor T. J. Parmley appointed for half time at \$600 to give full time and to receive \$1,200 a year.

H. J. Reich to be Graduate Assistant at a salary of \$800.

H. E. White, Gerald Kruger and C. W. Gartlein to be Graduate Assistants, each at a salary of \$700.

23. S. H. Slichter was granted leave of absence, without salary, for the academic year 1925-26.

24. The application of Professor W. A. Hurwitz for admission to the benefits of the William H. Sage Pension Fund was granted.

25. The President reported that the Carnegie Foundation had granted a widow's pension of \$1,150 to Mrs. James E. Creighton to begin April 15th, 1925.

26. By the concurrent vote of a majority of the total membership of the Board, the following amendments to the Statutes of the University were made :

ARTICLE I, paragraph 1, by inserting the words 'the New York State College of Home Economics' after the words 'the New York State College of Agriculture', and paragraph 2, line 8, by inserting the words 'and Home Economics' after the word 'Agriculture', and changing the word 'college' to 'colleges'.

ARTICLE IV, paragraph 7, by inserting the words 'the New York State College of Home Economics, the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station' after the words 'the New York State College of Agriculture', and paragraph 8 of the same article by inserting the words 'the New York State College of Home Economics, the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station' after the words 'the New York State Veterinary College'.

ARTICLE VI, paragraph 5, by inserting the words 'the New York State College of Home Economics' after the words 'the New York State College of Agriculture'.

ARTICLE VIII, by adding to paragraph 2, sub-division J, 'The Faculty of Home Economics'.

ARTICLE XV, paragraph 3, by inserting the words 'and the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station' after the words 'state colleges' in line 4, and cutting out the words 'and in' in the same line.

ARTICLE XVIII, paragraph 2, sub-division (A), by adding the words 'Home Economics (except those in the course of Institution Management)' after the word 'Agricultural'.

ARTICLE XIX, paragraph 1, sub-division (A), by adding the words 'Home Economics' after the words 'Agriculture and Horticulture'.

27. By the concurrent vote of a majority of the total membership of the Board, ARTICLE XI of the Statutes was amended to provide for one council to have charge of the administration of the New York State College of Agriculture, the New York State Veterinary College, the New York State College of Home Economics and the Agricultural Experiment Stations as follows :

THE STATE COLLEGES

The administration of the affairs of the New York State College of Agriculture, the New York State Veterinary College, the New York State College of Home Economics and the Agricultural Experiment Stations shall be under the control of the State College Council consisting of the President of the University, who shall be *ex-officio* chairman ; the five trustees appointed by the Governor ; the president of the State Agricultural Society ; the Commissioner of Agriculture ; the Commissioner of Education ; the trustee elected by the State Grange ; two trustees to be appointed by the Board of Trustees, one of whom shall be one of the trustees elected by the alumni ; the deans of the respective state colleges ; the director of experiment stations ; and four professors, heads of departments, two from the faculty of the College of Agriculture and one each from the Colleges of Home Economics and the Veterinary College to be elected by the respective faculties of said colleges for the term of one year. The Comptroller of the University shall be expected to be present at the meetings of the council and take part in its deliberations, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall act as secretary of the council.

This council in an advisory way and subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees shall have general supervision of the work of the State Colleges and Experiment Stations, the expenditure of their funds and all other matters pertaining to said colleges or experiment station. Said council shall hold four regular meetings each year and as many special meetings as may be deemed necessary. When practicable one of its regular meetings shall be held at the same place as, and as short a time as convenient before, each of the regular meetings of the Board of Trustees. It shall prepare each year for each institution a budget or detailed statement of the moneys to be expended in carrying on the work of said institution during the then ensuing year ; which budget, however, shall not become effective unless and until approved by the Board of Trustees ; and no liability or expense shall

be incurred in excess of the amount duly appropriated or authorized. Said council shall have the management of such lands as may be designated by the Board of Trustees for the use of the colleges and Experiment Stations.

In making appointments in the State Colleges or in the Experiment Stations the University assumes no responsibility for salaries in excess of appropriations received from time to time from the State of New York or the Federal Government for the maintenance of said institutions and in notifying appointees the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall call their attention to this section.

The dean of each college or the director of the Experiment Stations is authorized to make purchases for the institution under his immediate supervision and its departments to the amount appropriated by the Board of Trustees and to the amount of receipts from circulating funds, but no purchase shall be made or indebtedness created in the name of the college in excess of the amount duly appropriated and authorized.

28. The faculty members of the existing Agricultural College Council and Veterinary College Council, unless changed by the faculties of their respective colleges are to continue as members of the new council until the end of the term for which they were elected, and the faculty of the College of Home Economics shall select one of its number as a member of this council. The two members of the Board of Trustees elected to the council were requested to act as members of the new council until the end of the present academic year.

29. The following amendment to the Rules and Regulations of the University was made :

ARTICLE IV, paragraph 2, by the addition of the words 'In the College of Home Economics, two hundred dollars ;' after the words 'In the College of Agriculture, two hundred dollars' ; and by changing the same paragraph to read 'For the Summer Session, fifty dollars' ; 'For the Summer School in Agriculture, fifty dollars' ; and for the 'Summer School in Biology, fifty dollars'.

30. Leave of absence, without salary, was granted Dean G. G. Bogert for the academic year 1925-26.

31. The salary of Professor H. E. Whiteside was increased to \$5,000 a year with an additional \$1,000 salary for his service as Secretary of the College of Law, this increase to be effective at the beginning of the academic year 1925-26.

32. Prof. C. K. Burdick was appointed Acting Dean of the College of Law for the academic year 1925-26.

33. Dean A. R. Mann was appointed Dean of the College of Home Economics and Acting Dean C. Betten of the Agricultural College was

appointed Acting Dean of the College of Home Economics during Dean Mann's absence.

34. Sabbatic leave of absence was granted Dr. A. T. Kerr for the second term of the year 1925-26.

35. The President was authorized to appoint a temporary Committee of Administration not exceeding twelve members, and of which he shall be chairman, to assume jurisdiction of Willard Straight Hall until a regular administrative board can be elected or appointed according to the plan of the final organization. Authority was given this temporary committee of administration to engage a manager and to formulate and report to the Board of Trustees the form of a permanent organization for the control of the building.

It was Resolved, That a Willard Straight Hall fee of \$4 a term payable at the beginning of each term be required of every student at Ithaca, except those registered in the Graduate School.

36. The Comptroller was authorized to enter into the necessary agreement, subject to the approval of the University Attorney, with the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity, by which the University is to obtain an easement of certain property along the south bank of Fall Creek Gorge, with full control of the property for park purposes, subject to the right of the fraternity to sell with the option on the part of the University, however, to purchase at any time the property may be placed on the market for the sum of \$5,000. Any planting done on the property shall be done in such a way as not to interfere with the view of the house and any road constructed across the premises shall meet the approval of the University Architectural Advisory Board.

It was Resolved, That the trustees express to the Phi Gamma Delta Fraternity their sincere appreciation of the interest of the fraternity in the work of the University in developing Fall Creek Gorge, and of its assistance in such development.

37. The President's salary was increased to \$20,000 a year beginning with the next University year, the allowance for entertainment to remain the same and the question of a pension for himself and widow was referred to the pension committee.

38. The sale of the West Water Street property of the Andrew D. White Trust Fund in Syracuse was approved for a sum not less than \$45,000 and authority was granted to the Comptroller to execute the necessary deeds for a transfer of the University's interest in the property, such deed to be in a form approved by the University Attorney.

16. It was reported that the income from the Eleanor Tatum Long Scholarship Fund for the year ending July 1, 1925, had not been used and upon recommendation of the President the Treasurer was authorized to add any unused income to the principal fund in order to restore it to the original amount of \$30,000.

17. The request of the Department of Classics for an appropriation of \$200 to assist in providing a fund for the publication of a volume of the Cornell Studies in Classical Philology, the work of Professor Mountford and entitled "Mediaeval Glossaries" was made.

18. The Comptroller reported a contingent bequest to the University under the will of Jerome Adrian Frank, deceased.

19. Leave of absence, without salary, was granted W. G. McLaughry, Instructor in French, for the academic year 1925-26.

20. With the approval of the Committee on Schiff Lectures Pierre LePaulle was appointed Lecturer in the College of Law from the beginning of the academic year 1925-26 to the Christmas Recess, at a salary of \$3,000, payable from the Schiff Fund.

21. The following changes in salary were made for the academic year 1925-26 :

Dr. E. C. Showacre, Assistant Medical Adviser, to be \$3,250 instead of \$2,250.

Dr. H. A. Britton to be \$2,000 instead of \$3,000.

Walter H. French, Instructor in English, increased from \$2,100 to \$2,300.

A. Bless, Instructor in Physics at \$1,500 to be changed to a part-time position at a salary of \$750.

22. The President reported an appropriation by the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial of \$7,000 to Cornell University for the development of Parent Education work through the extension service of the College of Home Economics for the year beginning July 1, 1925, and ending June 30, 1926. This appropriation was accepted and the President authorized to express to the Memorial the appreciation of the Trustees.

23. The President reported that the General Education Board had made an appropriation of \$20,000 for the use of the Department of Anatomy of the Medical College in New York City, and an additional appropriation of \$25,000 a year for a period of five years, for the purpose of carrying on certain experimental work. This appropriation was accepted and the President authorized to express to the General Education Board the appreciation of the Trustees.

24. The President reported that he had been advised that the Grasselli Fellowship and the Grasselli Undergraduate Scholarship would be continued for the year 1925-26.

25. A temporary graduate scholarship in Physics for the academic year 1925-26 from funds available from the income of the Susanna Phelps Gage Fund for Research in Physics was established,

26. The question of the desirability of withdrawing from the competition for the designation of "Distinguished College" carried on by the War Department of Cornell University annually was referred to the Full Board.

27. The Comptroller was authorized to employ Messrs. Haskins & Sells to make the necessary audit of the University accounts, provided they may be obtained upon approximately the same terms as heretofore.

28. The Comptroller was authorized to pay the salaries of the deans of the different colleges either in twelfths or ninths, at the option of the recipients.

29. The Comptroller was authorized to sell a strip of land off the south end of the college boat house lots 16 feet wide, at a price not less than \$350, and to execute a deed therefor and attach thereto the University's corporate seal.

30. The matter of hereafter providing life guard in the Fall Creek Gorge during the swimming season was referred to the Comptroller with power, with the understanding that a guard should be provided immediately to serve until the opening of the 1925 Summer Session.

31. It was voted that the meetings of the Committee on General Administration for the months of July and August be held only on special call.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

JUNE 15, 1925.

At 10 A. M. Chairman Hiscock called the meeting to order. The following action was taken :

1. Authority was granted to the President to confer degrees on June 15th in accordance with the recommendations of the special faculties, upon students who have fulfilled all necessary requirements.

2. A communication was received from the Associate Alumni informing the Board of the election of Messrs. Fred M. Randall and Maxwell M. Upson as trustees of the University, each for a term of five years.

The Board then adjourned to attend Commencement exercises and reassembled at 2 P. M.

Present—Trustees Hiscock, Chairman ; Farrand, Eastman, Turner, Cornell, Mason, Metcalf, Miller, Newman, Place, Pratt, Randall, Sackett, Sanderson, Senior, Shepard, C. E. Treman, R. H. Treman, Upson, Van Namee, Wakeman, Westinghouse, Horace White, Whitman, R. B. Williams, R. H. Williams and Wilson ; Faculty Representatives Emerson and Burr and Comptroller Bostwick.

Regrets were received from Trustees J. DuPratt White, Graves, Pyrke, Cooke, Ickelheimer, Pound, Teagle and Van Cleef and Faculty Representative Thilly and their absence excused.

3. By ballot duly had and with the concurrent vote of more than fifteen trustees, Messrs. Geo. F. Baker, Charles M. Schwab and Henry R. Ickelheimer were elected trustees, each for a term of five years, to succeed themselves.

4. The following trustees were elected on the respective committees: Committee on Finance, Henry R. Ickelheimer; State College Council, Maxwell M. Upson; Medical College Council, H. H. Westinghouse and R. H. Williams.

5. The minutes of the meeting of the Board of April 25th, 1925, were approved as printed.

6. The minutes of the meeting of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds of April 24th, 1925, were approved as printed and the action therein contained ratified and confirmed.

7. The minutes of the Finance Committee meetings of April 14th and 25th, May 5th, 11th and 26th and June 1st, 1925, were approved as printed and the action therein contained ratified and confirmed.

8. The minutes of the Committee on General Administration of June 6th, 1925, were approved as printed, the action therein contained ratified and confirmed with the following correction; on page 1155 George H. Maughan should have been appointed Instructor of Physiology instead of Instructor in Physics at a salary of \$1,500.

9. The minutes of the Agricultural College Council and of the Veterinary College Council of April 24th, 1925, were approved as printed, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

10. The minutes of the State College Council of June 13th, 1925, were approved as read by the Secretary, the recommendations therein contained adopted and appointments and appropriations made as recommended.

11. Upon recommendation of the President and by ballot duly had the following were elected to the positions named to take effect July 1st, 1925:

M. A. Copeland to be Assistant Professor of Economics for a term of three years at a salary of \$3,500 a year.

Herbert D. Laube to be Assistant Professor of Law for a term of two years at a salary of \$4,500 a year.

12. The memorial on the death of Professor B. G. Wilder prepared by the Committee appointed for that purpose was presented and adopted as follows:

By the death on January 21, 1925, of Dr. Burt Green Wilder, Cornell University loses almost the last member of her original faculty. The pupil of Oliver Wendell Holmes, of Jeffries Wyman, of Asa Gray, of Louis Agassiz, and attached to these great teachers by an almost religious affection, he brought to our chair of zoology notable traditions. Since 1866 he had been Agassiz's assistant and it was Agassiz who, backed by Asa Gray, named him for the new institution, in whose fortunes both were deeply interested. Appointed

among the very first of its professors in September of 1867, more than a year before our doors were opened to students, Dr. Wilder was of great help in the gathering of our equipment; and for more than forty years, till his retirement from teaching in 1910 and his return in 1911 to the Massachusetts home of his boyhood, he served this university with a singular fidelity.

Born at Boston in 1841, he was a precocious lover of nature and his studies were from the first chiefly devoted to natural science; but at his issue from Harvard in 1862 the country's call took him into the hospitals of the civil war and to the front as a surgeon, and on his return in 1865 a further year was given to the completion of his medical studies. Then, however, he turned to the career of the scholar. At Cornell he showed himself from the start a teacher of rare powers. He was a master of exposition. The charm of his diction and the lucid grace of his style made him captivating alike by voice and pen. His lecture room was always crowded and his articles found welcome in our best magazines. But he was, before all, the patient and conscientious leader of research. Working quietly but tirelessly in the midst of his students, and ever ready to interrupt his investigation to listen to a question or to share with those about him some fascinating discovery, his laboratory was a fruitful nursery of budding scholarship. Nor was his interest in his students confined to class room and laboratory. Many bear in life-long memory the kindly word or thoughtful act that showed his sympathy in their personal haps and mishaps.

As did few others Dr. Wilder shared the unconventional ideals of the young university, and to the end he was their champion. For his personal convictions, too, he was always ready to do battle, and it never dismayed him if his cause was unpopular. For the simplified spelling of English, for a better nomenclature in anatomy, for temperance rather than abstinence in the use of alcoholics, against tobacco, against secret societies, against intercollegiate athletics, he stood with uncompromising frankness, regardless of opposition and of ridicule. Discrimination because of race or sex found always in him a zealous foe. This ruggedness of personality has given him large place in student legend as well as in the memory of his colleagues. In the faculty he was often a minority of one; but he held his ground, and the music of his diction, coupled with his unwavering courtesy, made him always gladly heard.

From the poverty of Cornell's early years none perhaps suffered more than Dr. Wilder and his work; but he bore its burdens and deprivations with exemplary patience, and through it all, despite the weight of his duties, he was a prolific contributor to the literature of science. His published papers number many scores. But he welcomed with joy the growing prosperity which enabled him to turn

over division after division of his biological teaching to new and soon independent departments and permitted his larger attention to those neurological studies which were ever the center of his interest. If even in this best loved field he leaves behind him no work of long breath, it is due not less to his sacrifice of self to his teaching and to the public spirit which spurred him to a share in righting every wrong than to his unbounded conscientiousness and his all too scrupulous concern for the details of method. Both as teacher and as investigator he leaves a name not soon to be forgotten.

15. The resignation of J. H. Nelson, Instructor in English, effective June 30th, 1925, was reported.

16. Upon the recommendation of the Commandant and the Faculty Committee on University Policy the President was authorized to request the withdrawal of Cornell University from the competition for the designation of "Distinguished College" conducted annually by the War Department.

17. An Engineering College Council was established to consist of the President, the Dean of the College of Engineering, and the Directors of the Schools of Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering and Electrical Engineering *ex-officio*, together with not more than six additional members who shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees

to represent the Board, the Alumni and such other interests as may be deemed advisable.

It shall be the duty of the Engineering Council to meet from time to time to consider the interests of the College of Engineering and to make to the Board of Trustees such recommendations as it may deem advisable.

It shall also be the function of the Engineering Council to act in an advisory capacity to the Dean and Directors of the College of Engineering in such questions as may appropriately come before it.

The appointment of the members on this Council was laid over until the Fall meeting of the Board.

18. Three scholarships of the value of \$500 annually were established for the College of Engineering to be known as the McMullen Scholarships. The terms of the award of these scholarships was referred to the Faculty of the Engineering College for recommendation.

19. The President made a short report on the work being accomplished by the Plan Commission.

20. The President reported a communication received from certain members of the faculty relative to the parking of cars west of White and McGraw Halls. This communication was referred to the Committee on General Administration with authority to take such action as it may deem advisable.

21. The question of changing the title of the College of Law to the Cornell Law School was laid over until the Fall meeting of the Board.

22. The Secretary was instructed to convey to Trustee Pound on behalf of the Trustees their deep sympathy for his bereavement in the death of Mrs. Pound.

23. The Committee appointed to arrange for the sending out of conspectuses prior to the meeting of the Full Board and the Committee on General Administration was discharged.

24. The Comptroller reported that the case of Louise Hamburger against Cornell University had been dismissed by the New York Court of Appeals.

25. The following resolution adopted by the Cornellian Council at its meeting held on June 13th, 1925, was approved and the appropriations made as therein recommended :

Resolved, That the Cornellian Council recommend to the Board of Trustees that of the net cash balance in the Alumni Fund at the end of the fiscal year the Board of Trustees appropriate \$10,000 to be used for further cost of construction of Boldt Hall and that they also appropriate from such funds the salary of the Alumni Representative, Foster M. Coffin, and that they add to the Cornell Alumni Endowment Fund those gifts which have been given during the year for

permanent endowment and that the balance of such funds be used as an emergency fund."

26. The following budget adopted by the Executive Committee of the Cornellian Council for the expenses of the Council for the year ending June 30, 1926, was approved and the appropriations made accordingly :

REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

To the Board of Trustees:

I have the honor to submit herewith the financial statement of Cornell University covering the fiscal year July 1, 1924, to June 30, 1925 inclusive.

INCOME AND EXPENSE

This year the increase in the tuition charge in the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Architecture, and Engineering from \$250. to \$300. took effect. The resultant increase in tuition was \$132,599.71. The gifts of alumni through the Cornellian Council available for current expenses increased from \$48,743.63 to \$77,833.51.

With the exercise of careful economy the expenses of the year of the endowed colleges at Ithaca were kept within the income available so that the year ended with a credit balance of \$2,596.54. By this balance and by an appropriation of \$35,000.00 from profits realized upon securities sold during the year, the debit balance of the income account on June 30, 1924 of \$434,802.15 was reduced to \$397,205.61.

Of this deficit accumulated during the few preceding years \$120,714.93 resulted from the purchase of land bordering on the campus and desired by the university to protect or supplement the existing campus; \$78,053.23 was for the equipment of new buildings, and \$198,438.45 from the ordinary running expenses of the university.

In the Medical College in New York City the net deficit in current income was \$67,085.47 which, added to the accumulated deficit July 1, 1924 of \$67,633.34 resulted in an accumulated deficit at the close of the year of \$134,748.93. This deficit results almost entirely from the failure of income from the International Traction Company securities given by Colonel Payne for the endowment of the college.

For accounting purposes the University is separated into five divisions: (A) the endowed colleges in Ithaca, (B) the Medical College in New York, (C) the Veterinary College in Ithaca, (D) the Agricultural College in Ithaca, and (E) the State Experiment Station at Geneva, N. Y. In sub-division A, which for accounting purposes may be termed the University, are included many general items of income and expense which inure to the benefit, in a varying degree, of the four other divisions, or to the use and benefit of the students registered in the colleges constituting those divisions. Some such items are the expense of the general administrative offices, the library, the infirmary, the residential halls, and the departments of music, hygiene, and military and physical training.

Except where specific restrictions require the principal and interest of a gift to the University to be kept separate from other funds, all investments of University funds are regarded as made for the University as a whole, and the annual income arising from such investments is distributed pro rata among the several specific funds held by and being the absolute property of the University. The rate of interest received during the year after transferring to the insurance reserve account the sum of \$16,640.65 was 5.4028007 per cent.

Of these uncollected subscriptions \$897,834.28 are from the classes of 1920-23 inclusive, payable through the Cornellian Council, and not yet due; \$1,397,518.55 are payable at the convenience of the donor; and \$292,008.69 are payable at definite dates which have not yet been reached. This leaves a balance of only \$331,982.23 of subscriptions which, by their terms, have matured but have not yet been paid. During the year in addition to \$11,477.55 paid through the Cornellian Council, there was paid in to the University on account of the principal of subscriptions, \$147,959.97. Of this amount \$26,590.81 was paid on account of principal maturing prior to the

beginning of the year; \$87,840.36 on principal maturing during the year; and \$33,528.80 on account of subscriptions not yet matured or payable at convenience. Interest amounting to \$60,964.75 was collected. Two hundred and eighty-seven extensions of time of payment were granted and six hundred and fifty subscriptions paid in full.

During the year the enlargement of the stadium at Schoellkopf Field by the Athletic Association was completed. Work has progressed rapidly on Willard Straight Hall and it is expected that the building will be turned over to the University this fall. The University is also constructing two apartment houses on Thurston Avenue, opposite Prudence Risley Hall. These houses will contain eighteen four-room apartments and will form the nucleus of a larger group if they prove successful and there is a demand for them.

The Department of Buildings and Grounds has been unusually busy during the year, largely with the routine work of the University. During the war much repair work was postponed and is now being done.

The demands upon the Department of Purchases continually increase and the results justify the organization of this department.

A central store room has been opened in the basement of Morse Hall from which office, electric, janitor and some laboratory supplies, and hardware are issued to the several departments. In connection with the store room there is operated a paper cutter, punch, padding machine, multigraph, mimeograph and duplicator, so that work of this nature may be promptly done for any department at a minimum expense.

In the residential halls 1,034 students were accommodated and 852,763 meals served. The average amount received for a meal was slightly under 40 cents, and the profit to the University was 7 and $\frac{3}{10}$ mills. Alumni reunions and conventions of learned societies were successfully handled. At the University luncheon in the Drill Hall on alumni day approximately 3,800 people were served, and the serving of meals for the members of the American Chemical Society and the New York State Bankers taxed the facilities of the University.

Itemized reports of the Treasurer, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, the Manager of Purchases, and the Manager of Residential Halls are appended hereto.

APPENDIX II

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

To the Comptroller:

Herewith please find the report of the Department of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1924-25.

The University property in charge of the Department of Buildings and Grounds has been maintained and is in as good condition if not improved over what it was a year ago. As in previous years, the Department did a very considerable amount of work other than maintenance. The principal items of chargeable work were: The renovation of the house at 11 East Avenue formerly owned by Prof. Rowlee; finishing a portion of the north attic of Goldwin Smith Hall for the Department of Economics; completing the roads and grading about the Baker Laboratory of Chemistry; paving South Avenue; new bridge across Cascadilla Creek at Dwyer's Dam; new steam and return lines 1500 feet long from South Avenue to Morrill Hall together with connections to the Willard Straight Hall; repaired a part of the wood stove pipe section of the conduit from Beebe Lake to the Power House; rewired and refixed Sage College; also made a beginning on putting in the sewer, water, steam, and electricity to the Faculty Apartments on Thurston Avenue. The gas will be put in by the New York State Gas and Electric Corporation. The north half of Morse Hall was razed.

A memorial in memory of the late Charles H. Hasbrouck, '94, who gave his Forest Home property to the University, was built the past year. The site selected for the memorial was the wooded area opposite the Hasbrouck Lodge between the Kline Road and Fall Creek. The memorial, designed by Mr. C. E. Lowrie, Landscape Artist of New York City, is a stone seat, built of the local quarry face stone similar to the stone used in the Baker Laboratory of Chemistry. The entrance to the area is marked by stone gate posts with a path leading from the entrance to the seat. The memorial faces the creek and is so placed that it commands a very pretty, attractive, and extended view of the stream and its wooded banks. Nearly \$700 has been spent on the memorial to date. It is the intention to further improve and beautify the place and make a very attractive spot.

For the State Colleges, the Department under Special Fund Estimate authorization, fitted up the attic of the Dairy Industry Building for office use; began work on the removal and remodelling of the Rural Engineering Buildings in order to clear the site of the proposed Plant Industry and Library Buildings.

The janitorial service for the year has been very satisfactory. The wages were increased slightly and while the increase is not large it was enough so that the personnel of the janitorial staff can be improved. There were only two changes in the force during the year, both on account of ill-health. At the present price of living, the pay of the janitors is not as liberal as it should be.

The buildings are in good repair particularly with reference to small items, the greatest need at the present time being interior decoration which was carried on more extensively in the year just closing and will be continued in the year to come.

The power plant and transmission lines as well as electrical equipment have been maintained in good condition and with many substantial betterments of transmission lines. The flow of Fall Creek for the year was such that it was only necessary to take on City service for a few days in July, September, and November. There has been, as will be seen further on in the report, a considerable increase in the use of electric current during the year. This fact together with the growth of the University including the Willard Straight Hall and the Faculty Apartments make it desirable to keep in mind the enlargement of the power house to provide increased capacity.

The fuel situation for the year was very comfortable with prices practically the same as in the year before. The coming year starts in with nearly or quite one-third of the total yearly requirements in storage.

The Grounds Section of the Department was very active during the year as a large part of the chargeable work called for a large amount of excavation and work properly done by common labor. In addition, this section had charge of the quarry operation in supplying stone to Willard Straight Hall.

The water supply including filtration and distribution had a comfortable year supplying the University needs, not including the State Colleges, with an adequate supply of good water. The daily average consumption was about 382,000 gallons.

The new roof on the Drill Hall was commenced in the fall of 1924. The work was about three-fourths completed at the end of the year. The State appropriated \$75,000 for this work.

The Heating Plant furnished an adequate supply of steam to heat the buildings of the institution including the State Colleges. There was an increase in output this year over that of last year. The increasing demand for steam together with the growth of the University, considering the present boiler capacity, makes it desirable to provide additional source of supply. To meet the situation an appropriation was made for an additional boiler, making the fifth in the plant, a duplicate of the ones now installed.

At the Agricultural College, considerable work has been done by this Department under the Special Fund Estimate providing roads, walks, and grading about the Dairy Building, clearing the site of the proposed Plant Industry Building of water and sewer pipes and providing new quarters for the rural Engineering Department.

For the Veterinary College, the Department has prepared plans and specifications which were paid for by the Veterinary College for the Second Story of the Surgical Ward. There is an appropriation of \$37,000 covering this work.

The average number of employees for the year is 260, as compared with 179 last year or an increase of nearly 48 per cent. The increase in number is very

largely in Grounds labor. The reason for this is the large amount of work other than maintenance that the Department did last year. South Avenue paving and bridge, grading of Reservoir and East Avenue, and Special Fund Estimate work for the State Colleges are the larger items.

The total expenditure of \$192,309.01 compares with \$184,988.86 a year ago. This difference of \$7,320.15 is largely in four items: Care of Buildings, Heating, Grounds, and Fire Service. The Care of Buildings increase was due to increase of wages; the increase in Heating expense, insufficient appropriation; Grounds, to being more generous with the upkeep; and the Fire Service, for more inspection and general operating costs.

*The total amount of current reported for the year 1923-24, 1,713,635 KWH, was too large by 104,000 KWH, the amount taken from the City, which was duplicated in the total. Deducting the 104,000 KWH gives the revised total of 1,609,635 KWH, as above.

It will be noted from the above record that the current used in 1923-24 was 6328 KWH or .4 per cent increase over 1922-23 and the current used in 1924-25 exceeded 1923-24 by 201,592 KWH or 12.5 per cent. The City current used in 1923-24 was 104,000 KWH and in 1924-25 only 26,400 KWH. This difference in the City current is due to two causes; namely, stream flow and to dam construction in the year 1923-24 when it was necessary to shut down the University Plant for a few days.

It will be noted by comparison with the record of last year that the large increase in electric current used by the University is principally in the Residence Halls and Baker Laboratory and College of Engineering power requirements. There are other increases in consumption but sufficient decreases to more than offset them.

If the rate of increase of the year 1924-25 over 1923-24 continues, it will not be long before the capacity of the present power plant will be reached.

The fuel required to operate the University Heating Plant for the year was 29,055 tons; all other departments exclusive of the State Colleges, 1,933 tons, making a total of 30,988 tons. It will be noted that the heating plant only increased 778 tons while the other departments decreased 190 tons, making a net increase of 588 tons. The increase and decrease as noted above are due largely to the discontinuance of local independent heating plants and connecting them up with the central plant.

The expenditure for fuel for the past year was \$130,117.11 as compared with \$131,956.15 a year ago. It will be noted that the cost of heating plant fuel, including unloading, was \$3.87 a ton the past year compared with \$3.83 in 1923-24 or 4 cents a ton, practically a negligible amount. The other departments fuel cost was \$6.54 as compared with \$7.79 a year ago; the reserve, \$11.28 as compared with \$8.50 the previous year. This great difference is due probably to being more largely domestic sizes of anthracite and less of the finer grades and smokeless bituminous coal.

The distribution and the total output of steam for the year are shown by the table on page 125.

The total amount of steam used during the year was 357,568 M pounds, 12,441 M pounds more than the last year, or 3.4 per cent. This increase is largely in the Agricultural College, 7,833 M pounds; Residential Halls, 2,546 M pounds; Cascadilla, 620 M pounds, and Sage College, 561 M pounds more than in the year previous. The remainder of the increase, or 11,560 M pounds, is made up in small amounts by the buildings heated from the central plant. The total output represents approximately 11,500 M pounds steam per ton of coal. The cost a thousand pounds of steam at the plant was 40.74 cents as compared with 40.4254 cents last year. The cost distributed at the buildings is 72.53 cents a thousand pounds compared with 69.01 cents a year ago. The difference in the manufacturing cost in the two years is small. The increased cost in distribution of 3.53 is due in part at least to the increased interest and depreciation brought about by the large expenditure for the new steam line from South Avenue to the north end of Morrill Hall, the balance by unusually heavy maintenance and supply expense.

The total appropriations for the year amounted to \$80,681.84, being \$9,732.02 less than the year before, while the amount spent, \$51,703.21, was \$18,194.79 more than the previous year. The large items of expenditure were for the South Avenue Paving and Dwyer's Dam Bridge, and the grading and paving of East and Reservoir Avenues about the Baker Laboratory of Chemistry. These two items amount to \$36,629.84, or over 70 per cent of the whole expenditure of the year on improvements and betterments.

These expenditures do not include any Special Fund Estimate work that the Department did for the State Colleges during the year which was a very considerable amount.

APPENDIX III

REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF PURCHASES

September 10, 1925.

To the Comptroller:

During the past year the Purchasing Department has undergone rather radical reorganization in order to allow for the establishment of a central storeroom. The issue of supplies from the offices in Morrill Hall and Roberts Hall has been discontinued, thereby eliminating stores record keeping and stores accounts in the two offices.

The west wing of Morse Hall has been remodeled and equipped for a storeroom and all office supplies, electrical supplies, janitor's supplies and some laboratory and hardware supplies are now issued and billed to the various departments of the University from there.

In connection with the storeroom is operated a paper cutter, punch, padding machine, multigraph, mimeograph and duplicator so that work of that kind may be done for any of the departments with the least delay and at a minimum expense.

A visible index of perpetual inventory is kept for about a thousand items stocked in the storeroom and through the stores accounts are also carried the issues to departments from the Chemical Storeroom in Baker Laboratory and the pool orders for laboratory equipment and supplies and for photographic work and supplies.

The storehouse is also used as a clearing house for the transfer or sale of unused equipment and a large quantity of material has been transferred or turned into cash in this way. The University Messenger Service is operated in connection with deliveries from the storeroom.

Increased office space at Roberts Hall has been made available this past year and has relieved the crowded condition which hampered that office during the preceding two years.

Included in this report are tables showing a summary of requisitions received and orders placed during the year; a summary of requisitions handled by months; a statement of purchases by months made by the offices in Morrill Hall and Roberts Hall, a statement of purchases made by the office in Morrill Hall on State Funds; a statement of charge slips issued by both offices before and during the transfer of stock to the central storeroom, and a statement of stores orders on the storeroom.

It is interesting to note that 4,376 stores orders were issued amounting to \$29,232.57, as against 3,305 orders amounting to \$23,369.48 the previous year. The percentage of stores orders to total orders was 20.3% as against 16.8% the previous year.

The total inventory value of stores supplies on June 30, was \$16,362.81. Additional items are being constantly added to stock as fast as the necessity for them becomes apparent and satisfactory prices in quantity can be obtained.

Permit me to present the report of the Department of Residential Halls for the year 1924-25.

During the year one cottage at 308 Wait Avenue has been added to the dormitory system.

In the period from July 1, 1924, to June 30, 1925, a total of 852,763 meals were served by the Residential Halls, in their dining rooms and cafeterias. In the halls of residence 1,034 students were accommodated.

During Alumni Days the halls of residence and dining rooms were used to capacity. With the increased numbers of Alumni returning under the Dix plan of reunions it is not possible to house them adequately in the present dormitories. Two buffet luncheons were served at the Drill Hall, the first providing for 1,297 and on Saturday (Alumni Day) 3,800 people were served.

In September the members of the American Chemical Society attending the meeting in Ithaca were housed in Prudence Risley Hall, Sage College and the Men's Residential Halls. Meals were served for them in Risley Hall and Sage College Dining Rooms.

The week following Commencement in June, members and guests attending the New York State Bankers' Convention were housed in Prudence Risley Hall, Sage College and the Baker Dormitories and were served meals in the Risley Hall and Sage College Dining Rooms.

During the college year 140 students were regularly employed in the dining rooms and cafeterias, receiving in return their board or a fixed wage per hour. May I mention again the keen spirit of cooperation shown by both the regular and student employees.

In Cascadilla Hall three bath rooms were remodelled. This work should be completed during the coming year. The installing of a new lighting system has been started.

In Prudence Risley Hall a new hot water system for the eastern section of the building has been installed. All the bath rooms in the building have been painted. The rooms on the fifth floor have been redecorated. This work should be continued throughout the building. New upholstery for the furniture and new draperies have been supplied for the first floor.

In Sage College in the study rooms and corridors a new lighting system has been installed. The six small drawing rooms have been redecorated and the dining rooms have been remodelled and redecorated. The work of redecorating should be continued throughout the building. New furniture and draperies are needed in the six small drawing rooms on the first floor.

In Baker Court and Founders Hall the system of locks has been repaired. The floors in all these buildings need repairing and the woodwork throughout the buildings should be refinished.

A standard system of lighting similar to that in Boldt Hall would be more satisfactory to the students in these buildings and such a system would result in a saving in the amount of electricity used.

At 5 East Avenue a new roof has been placed on the house.

At 7 South Avenue the interior of the house has been redecorated and a new lighting system has been installed. The outside of this house should be painted.

At 332 Wait Avenue the drawing rooms and corridors have been redecorated.

The laundry has run to capacity during the year. During the busiest periods both the dormitory and dining room departments have been handicapped because the laundry could not turn out work faster, due to lack of space for more adequate equipment.
