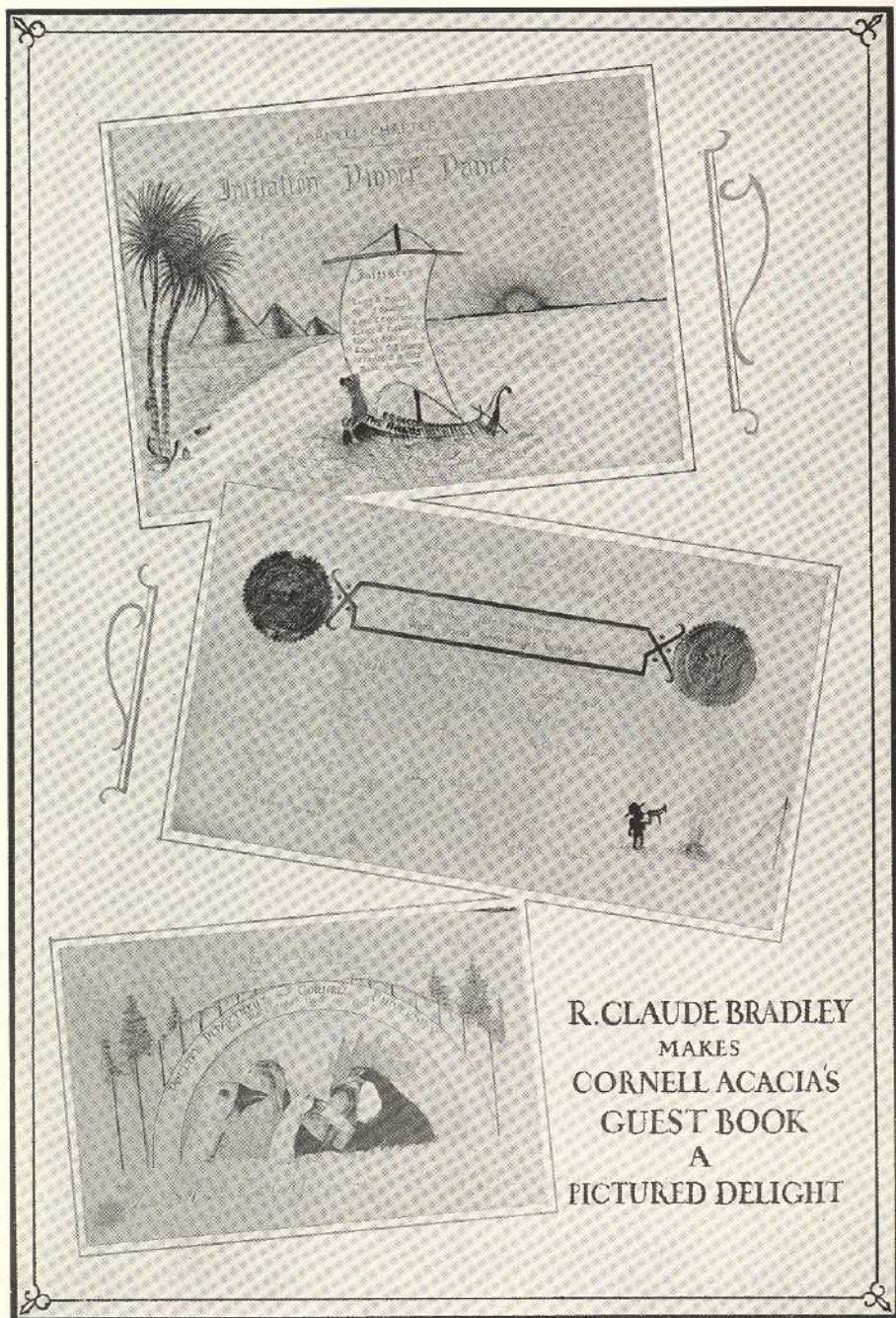

## Let's Pan the Alumni!

"Did you honestly mean all you said in that tirade against old Rho Chi?" I inquired when we were comfortably seated in the dining-room.

"Every word," said Slim. "I've been storing up that grouch ever since I graduated. Now that it's out maybe I'll feel better, but I do think we are all wrong financially. I wish they would handle our chapter money like your fraternity does."

"Applesauce," I said. "Your fraternity is no worse off than any other. Finances are the big problem in most of them. Always have and probably will be for a long, long time. I don't know how much my chapter owes, but I know they ask the alumni for money."

"Do they get it?" Slim inquired smiling.

"From a certain group of old standbys—yes! from the big majority—no!"

"It's all wrong, isn't it?" said Slim.

I agreed that it was and that some-

thing should be done. Then we changed the subject.

I didn't see Slim after that, but I received a walloping letter from him a few days after our luncheon. What a wonderful letter that was! Just exactly like Slim. Here are a few paragraphs from it. In the light of the problem of fraternity finances they are interesting, to say the least. Listen to this:

"Now let's pan the alumni. There's no doubt about it, Tommy—our fraternities were lucky to get us. Here we are, both of us, slaving away to get rich so that we can go back and burn the mortgage for them. Like fabulous Uncle Bims, from far-off Australia, some day we'll shower the boys with gold pieces. How fortunate they are! What a good time they'll have when the sun rises on that glorious day—and what a long hungry wait in the meantime!

"Now as a matter of fact, it will be a couple of decades before I can try a match on an asbestos mortgage that bears my own proud signature, at the present rate of my galloping progress. I'm not so sure about you, but that is where I stand and this is what I'm coming to: What is to be done in the meantime?

"My fraternity needs the help of every alumnus it's got. It needs more money than it will ever get for a long time. Present contributions don't even do what, in my opinion, the body of alumni should do—they don't even pay the interest on the mortgage. Our boys are gallantly struggling to pay this interest, pay for repairs, add a little furniture now and then, and in general leave a little more than they

find. Are they to be encouraged to follow the example of most of the present worthy alumni and look forward to graduation when they can leave and forget? 'After-me-the-deluge' stuff. (I remember that from some history course or other).

"I think it's all wrong. I'm proud of my fraternity. I've never visited the chapter but I'm going to. Feel differently about the whole question since our luncheon. I felt like panning the chapter that day. Now I feel like panning the alumni.

"I get all puffed up when anyone asks me what fraternity I belong to. They always look surprised when I tell them. They say, 'Oh, yes!' and look as if they can't figure out how I ever made it. I get a real ten-dollar thrill. It doesn't cost me a single, solitary cent, and I think it should. It is certainly worth something. How much I don't know, but I'll say it is worth as much as I pay for the privilege of calling myself a Mason, which privilege I am also very proud of, and very glad to pay for.

"Now, Tommy, being a Mason myself, you can understand the point I want to make.

"Don't you think it's worth as much as your Blue Lodge dues to be an alumnus of the Michigan chapter of Acacia? Isn't it worth that much to

every other Acacia man? Why don't you put this up to your alumni, if what you said when I saw you is true, that these lads in that splendid chapter of yours need a little help right along from *every* alumnus, not just from those same good old 'standbys,' that always have their generous fists ready to plug the hole in the dyke?

"You've got a wonderful example there. You're a Masonic organization and why shouldn't every Acacia alumnus be just as anxious to help his chapter every year as to help his Blue Lodge? They both need it.

"I'm going to put up to my fraternity the proposition of small annual dues to the active chapter for every alumnus and I'm going to *put it over*.

"Why?"

"Because I think there will be fewer sore heads, like me, among the alumni who never give that little knot of men a red cent and who kick because the boys want, once in a while, a little of the help we got when they handed us a nice, big, comfortable house that was mostly paid for."

I haven't yet told Slim that my fellow alumni in Michigan Acacia have been doing just this—at least trying to and succeeding pretty well—for the past three years. Maybe I will some time. — (Reprinted from the *Triad of Acacia*.)

And by the way, Brother Alumni, let's tell the actives that we are with them in their undertakings, and encourage them by writing checks and letters.

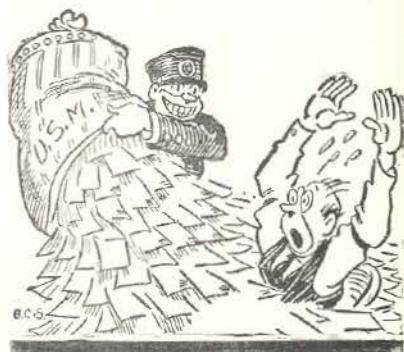

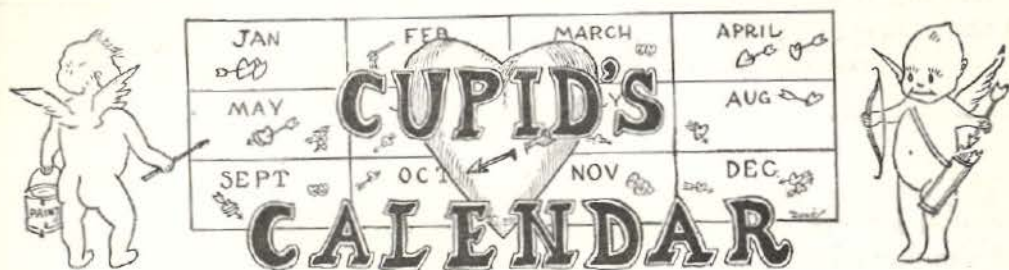

## Cornell and Syracuse Chapters Hold Joint Banquet

### Cornell Cops Ball Game

Saturday evening, May 14, the Cornell and Syracuse Chapters held their Annual Banquet at Krebbs Inn, Skaneateles, N. Y., the same place at which the event was held last year.

As a curtain riser for the big feed, the teams of the two Chapters engaged in the usual friendly game of ball, the fray occurring on the Skaneateles High School diamond. After seven innings of fun and laughter, the Cornellians were declared victors with a count of 6—2. The triumph was largely due to the excellent pitching of Mortimer, who turned in seventeen strike-outs.

The chefs at The Krebbs are noted over the East for their excellent food, but it seemed that they out-did themselves this evening. Being forewarned from last year, we all came prepared by a day of semi-fasting, but it was of no avail. Even "Bill" Mills and "Tiny" Robey were stumped and they are the heaviest pair of roommates in the house, tipping the beams to one quarter ton.

The banquet was presided over by Theodore P. Hall, Syracuse, who was remarkably over-supplied with stories from the early life of each speaker. Dean R. Marble, Cornell, and Carl Lewis, Syracuse, Venerable Deans of their respective Chapters, presented the respects of their actives and expressed the universal hope that the Joint Banquet might become a traditional event. Dean Louis Mitchel, Syracuse, presented an educator's view of the value of fraternities and told why Acacia is an especially de-

sirable institution on a university campus. Riley Heath, Cornell, spoke about Masonry. He told us that he considered the ritualistic work, beautiful as it is, as but secondary, and that the close association between men, especially of men from divergent walks and classes of life, is its real justification. He pointed out how Acacians as college men can broaden their own experience as well as that of their brother Masons by forming close associations with non college men in the Lodges.

A vocal trio from Syracuse and a piano duet from Cornell added doubtful harmonies to the universal concord, while the ensemble frequently joined in favorite college songs. The affair was closed by singing the two Alma Maters.

About seventy-five Acacians were present, including W. A. Hosner of the Harvard Chapter. There were eleven Cornell Alumni and twenty-nine actives.—E. W. H.

### What Do You Think?

By the end of his recent visit Grand Secretary Ekblaw had completed for the Grand Council a voluminous report upon the condition of the Cornell Chapter. In his conclusion he summed up his findings in these words: "An excellent chapter. Weakness in alumni support and organization. New house deserved by chapter and needed. All departments going good."

What is the full meaning of these few words?

He meant that this Chapter is one of the few that are handling active finances in a business-like way. One of the few that uses the budget and sticks within the allowances. A Chapter which insists on saving a large enough surplus in the spring to enable them to start again in the fall without taking up an assessment to pay old bills, as is a common expedient among college fraternities. He meant that the Active Chapter is doing its best to promote scholarship, brotherhood, Masonry, and all the other ideals of Acacia.

But he also intimated that after leaving Cornell we are prone to forget that there is an Active Chapter back in Ithaca attempting to carry on. He intimated that an alumnus owes something more to the Fraternity, just as he owes more to Cornell than he ever paid in tuition, or in undergraduate enthusiasm. But from his vast fund of experience, Bro. Ekblaw explained that this apparent forgetfulness is really due to lack of an alumni organization through which the individuals can act. He stated that the formation of an alumni chapter always results in more results for less individual effort and trouble.

## NEW MEMBERS

## WILLIAM HARRISON POWERS

"Doc" Powers was born May 11, 1888, at Morristown, N. Y., a town situated on the St. Lawrence River in the Thousand Islands region. He states that the name Thousand Islands gives but a low estimate of the correct number and as he is a Methodist Minister we cannot suspect him of exaggeration.

He prepared first at Morristown High and finished at Cazenovia Seminary. While there he was elected president of the Athletic Association and also of the Y. M. C. A. He then proceeded to Syracuse University for his Bachelor's Degree, majoring in Philosophy. On graduation he became Pastor of the James St. Methodist Church of Syracuse and served there eight years. Six years ago Brother Powers came to the First Methodist Church of Ithaca and has been hard at work here since. In pursuit of further light he has entered the Graduate School of Cornell and is registered for his M. A. This work is carried on in spite of a heavy church schedule and is an excellent example for all of us.

Doctor Powers was Raised in Ho-

basco Lodge No. 716, of Ithaca, and was initiated into Acacia April 23, 1927.

## JOHN PAUL BLANCHARD

Paul is one of the celebrated mountaineers (lacking hairy ears), having spent his entire boyhood in the heart of the Adirondacks. He was born August 10, 1905, at Blue Mountain Lake, and at the tender age of three moved to the neighboring village of Raquette Lake. Of course, we presume that he moved not, but his parents and family moved for him.

He served the Illinois Steel Company for a year as draughtsman of power houses and was located at the plant at Gary, Ind. But in 1925 the call of study got the better of him and he returned to school, this time at Cornell. Garrelts is an Instructor in Structural Engineering and is doing graduate work in that field.

He was Entered in Hobasco Lodge, No. 716, of Ithaca and expects the Third Degree May 26. He was pledged to Acacia April 7, 1927, and is expected to do some peculiar traveling at the close of this month. In the meantime Mr. and Mrs. Garrelts have become popular attendants at House Dances and the lesser half of the family is playing stellar baseball on the Acacia team.

#### PETER OLAFSON

Pledge Olafson but narrowly escaped being a subject of the English King, for on January 25, 1897, he was born at Gardar, N. Dak., only a few miles from the Canadian Border. It was here also that he started his school work. For three years he attended the High School at Grand Forks, N. Dak., and he played on the basketball team the last year there.

North Dakota is noted for its "Bad Lands," but it also has miles of beautiful agricultural land and so from 1916 till 1921 "Olie" helped operate a large farm, though he says he gained nothing but experience. His first connection with the United States Army was in the S. A. T. C. at North Dakota Agies in 1918. At Cornell he got into the Advanced Course of the R. O. T. C. and is now a Reserve Officer in the U. S. A. Veterinary Corps, and a member of the Cornell Officers' Club.

Olafson was Entered in Hobasco Lodge No. 716, of Ithaca, April 14, 1927 and expects to be Raised May 26. He was pledged to Acacia April 7, 1927 and will be initiated as soon as he receives the "Third."
