



**Why is there concern?** Researchers are concerned that even at low levels, environmental estrogens we are exposed to may work together with the body's own estrogen to increase the risk of breast cancer.

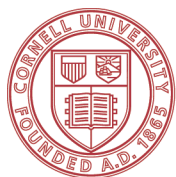
